Milk Marketing, Farm Assessment Two Crucial Problems In 1967

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Milk marketing and farm assessment are the two crucially important issues which will have to be solved during 1967 in York County, Agricultural Representative A. A. Wall notes in his year-end report.

In respect to milk marketing he points out that the situation in this county is more complex than in most other counties. He expects lots of hard thinking as well as tolerance will be needed by the time pooling comes into effect on June 1.

Farm assessment, with York County's assessor recommending assessment of all real property in the county at market value, is a matter for grave concern.

Mr. Wall also refers to the many farm families who have left York County in the last 15 years to continue farming in other counties. Most recent of these are the Allan Ors, the Elliott Harringtons, the Cam Kennedys, the Joe Lanthiers and the John Jaynes. In the last decade and a half the numbers run well into the hundreds.

(Continued from Page 1) year have been Allan C. Peck of 19 Westwood Lane Richvale, who served as vice-chairman; Morley J. Kinnee of Maple and E. W. Snider of Kleinburg. Appointments are made for three years with one appointment running out each year. Thus, Mr. Peck has now been reappointed from January 1967 to 1970; next December, Mr. Kinnee will either be reappointed or replaced and in December 1968, Mr. Snider's appointment will run out. Although previously board members served without remuneration, beginning in 1966, in accordance with new provincial legislation, they have been paid an honorarium of \$60 monthly, plus a mileage allowance. The high school board meets the fourth Monday of each month at its offices at 59 Yonge Street North, Richmond Hill, which meetings are open to the public. As well, board members usually attend a committee meeting once a week and represent the board at various local functions such as school openings, commencement exercises, etc. and attend several conventions throughout the year.
