be held until after the auditor's report is made, he was told that the date is set by the Department of Education. "Then I think you should take the matter up with the department and have it changed. Make a note of that Mr. Secretary," he said. Another ratepayer asked why amalgamation with the Thornhill Board is desirable. Mr. Taylor noted that a larger unit is always more efficient. "With a larger number of pupils, teachers and classrooms, we could provide ancillary services neither board can afford alone. In the past we have had supervisors of music, physical education and the primary division but we have had to drop them because we could not afford them. With a bigger organization we can cut costs by bulk buying of supplies, also," he said. Asked about the deficit, Peter Smith, who has been chairman of the board's finance committee for the past year, said there were two alternatives, either to raise the mill rate or to go after the province for additional grants. "Our basis of assessment is unbalanced. We have a high residential percentage but do not enjoy the percentage of industrial assessment we need. We

raised the mill rate this year with regret and we cannot go too far in this direction, so we will continue to press the province for more help. We are not the only board with the same problem," he stated. The board employs 42 teachers to teach 1070 children at a total cost of instruction of \$186,689, Trustee Sam Neill reported in answer to a question from another ratepayer. Minimum salary is \$4,000 and the highest salary \$7,100. Business Administrator Jack Matthews reported that \$60,000 to \$65,000 in assessment had been picked up since September, in answer to another questioner. In addressing the meeting after his nomination, Mr. Logan felt the board needed a troubleshooter, a member who will investigate and report. "If elected I will be digging up every skeleton I can," he promised. People who have worked with me will tell you I am a perpetual snooper," he added. After the election Mr. Logan returned to questioning the trustees, particularly on the amount paid to teachers and reported demands for increases and fringe benefits they will be seeking in 1967.

**To Hold Inquest Into Car Deaths**

An inquest will be held into the death of two men, who were killed December 30 when their car smashed into the CNR Overpass abutment on Don Mills Road, near Newmarket. However, Chief Fred Mason, Whitchurch Township Police, said no date has been set as yet. Killed in the early-evening collision were the driver, James Francis Dowling, 26, Toronto, and his passenger, Albert Ingarra, 43, of Gormley, both of whom were employed with a Toronto meat packing firm. Police and ambulance attendants had to use crowbars to remove the bodies from the car, which was believed to have hit the abutment head-on, and was nearly cut in half by the impact. Police said part of the car engine was found in the back seat.

A Langstaff family of five was treated for injuries at York Central Hospital following an accident at Jane Street and the Maple Sideroad Saturday afternoon. Mr. and Mrs. Sandy Neal, and their three children, Terry, 13; Bill, 9; and John, 12, were injured when their car was in collision with a garbage disposal truck, driven by Thomas F. Gough, of S. L. Wright and Sons, Weston. Mr. Gough has been charged with making an improper left turn. Mr. and Mrs. Neal both suffered bruised ribs and chest injuries, while Terry received lacerations to her forehead and possible concussion, and both boys suffered fractured right wrists. All were released from hospital after treatment. Two other accidents in Vaughan Township New Year's Day involved lone drivers. The first one occurred when a car driven by James E. Aylett, Aurora, skidded into a ditch on Dufferin Street in front of the Lands and Forests building, and was damaged to the extent of \$300. A few hours later, Penny Hawksworth, 18, of RR 1, Maple, was the driver of a car, which went out of control on Concession 5, south of Teston, and hit a hydro pole. Miss Hawksworth was removed to York Central Hospital for treatment of a concussion. Her car, a 1960 model, was completely wrecked.

**Whlse Hydro Rates Went Up January 1 — No Local Increase**

Richmond Hill Hydro is going to have to pay more for its wholesale power in 1967. Provincial officials have informed the local commission that wholesale costs will go up approximately \$7,500 during the coming year. Richmond Hill's wholesale bill was \$375,000 in 1966. This will mark the first wholesale increase Richmond Hill has had since 1961. However there will be no increase in the rates to the consumer. Any provincial increase will be absorbed by the commission. A total of 49 local residents took advantage of hydro's second annual electric blanket offer. Anyone purchasing an electric clothes dryer during the fall from the appliance dealer of their choice received a free electric blanket as a bonus. Only a total of 45 tenants have applied for a refund under the commission's deposit refund plan which came into effect on November 1. Under the new plan tenants consumers in any category, domestic, commercial or industrial who have had a satisfactory pay record for the period of one year is eligible for a refund. Property owners do not pay a deposit. Domestic tenants pay a deposit of \$15 while commercial users pay \$25.
