Historic Edgeley Gives Name To New Development

This latter feature is a keen concern of the architect for the \$25 million project, 40-year-old Irving Grossman who designed the unique Flemingdon Park three years ago, where all cars were banished underground, leaving all space above ground

At Edgeley, cars will be banished to a walled compound. The communal main street, 32 feet wide, will be free of all traffic. Children

Various areas of the development have been planned as treed, open squares or piazzas to stimulate social life. Schools, community centre and other services will be specifically placed in order to encourage people to develop a community sense. A theatre for plays, films and lectures already exists on the nearby campus of York University.

The project will include both an elementary and a high school, churches, community centre, possibly a library and the neighborhood feeling of a row of small shops. With its fusing of public and private housing it is expected to be a sociological experiment which will provide data on modern community relations. Homeowners, low-income tenants, children and old-age pensioners will mingle in community parks and squares.

Thus the new Edgeley, while entirely original in concept and design, will contain much of the old and is of the long-ago community ment which is usually lacking in contemporary "box design" suburban subdivi-






