Historic Edgeley Gives Name To New Development

Long-time residents of the area who may fear that the small hamlet of Edgeley is about to disappear, bulldozed out of existence by Vaughan Township's expanding industrial area, will be pleased to know that the name at least is to be perpetuated in a North York housing development in the Jane and Steeles area.

Described as a suburban housing development with a difference and designed after the plan of a medieval village, it is planned to provide a human, sociable environment for about 5,000 people. The 95-acre site is immediately south of Black Creek Pioneer Village and is bounded on the east and

west by Jane Street and the Black Creek Ravine.

As the Stong farm and several of the buildings in Pioneer Village were at what was originally known as Edgeley, before its centre gravitated northward to Highway 7 and Jane Street, officials of the Ontario Housing Corporation thought it fitting that the development should commemorate the historical name of the old village.

The project, which is planned to start this spring, combines public as well as private housing and both the Ontario Housing Corporation and Central Mortgage and Housing are involved along

with private developers. Plans call for 28% public housing, 24% private homes, 14% open park, pedestrian malls and squares and a very low 8.5% for roads, only half the usual designated space.

This latter feature is a keen concern of the architect for the \$25 million project, 40-year-old Irving Grossman, who designed the unique Flemington Park three years ago, where all cars were banished underground, leaving all space above ground for people.

At Edgeley, cars will be banished to a walled compound. The communal main street, 32 feet wide, will be free of all traffic. Children

will be able to use the main street, cross a bridge over a landscaped ravine and go to school without once encountering a car.

Various areas of the development have been planned as trees, open squares or piazzas to stimulate social life. Schools, community centre and other services will be specifically placed in order to encourage people to develop a community sense. A theatre for plays, films and lectures already exists on the nearby campus of York University.

The project will include both an elementary and a high school, churches, community centre, possibly a

library and the neighborhood feeling of a row of small shops. With its fusing of public and private housing it is expected to be a sociological experiment which will provide data on modern community relations. Homeowners, low-income tenants, children and old-age pensioners will mingle in community parks and squares.

Thus the new Edgeley, while entirely original in concept and design, will contain much of the old and is planned to re-establish some of the long-ago community feeling and mutual involvement which is usually lacking in contemporary "box design" suburban subdivisions.
