

Local Girls Capture Badminton "Doubles"

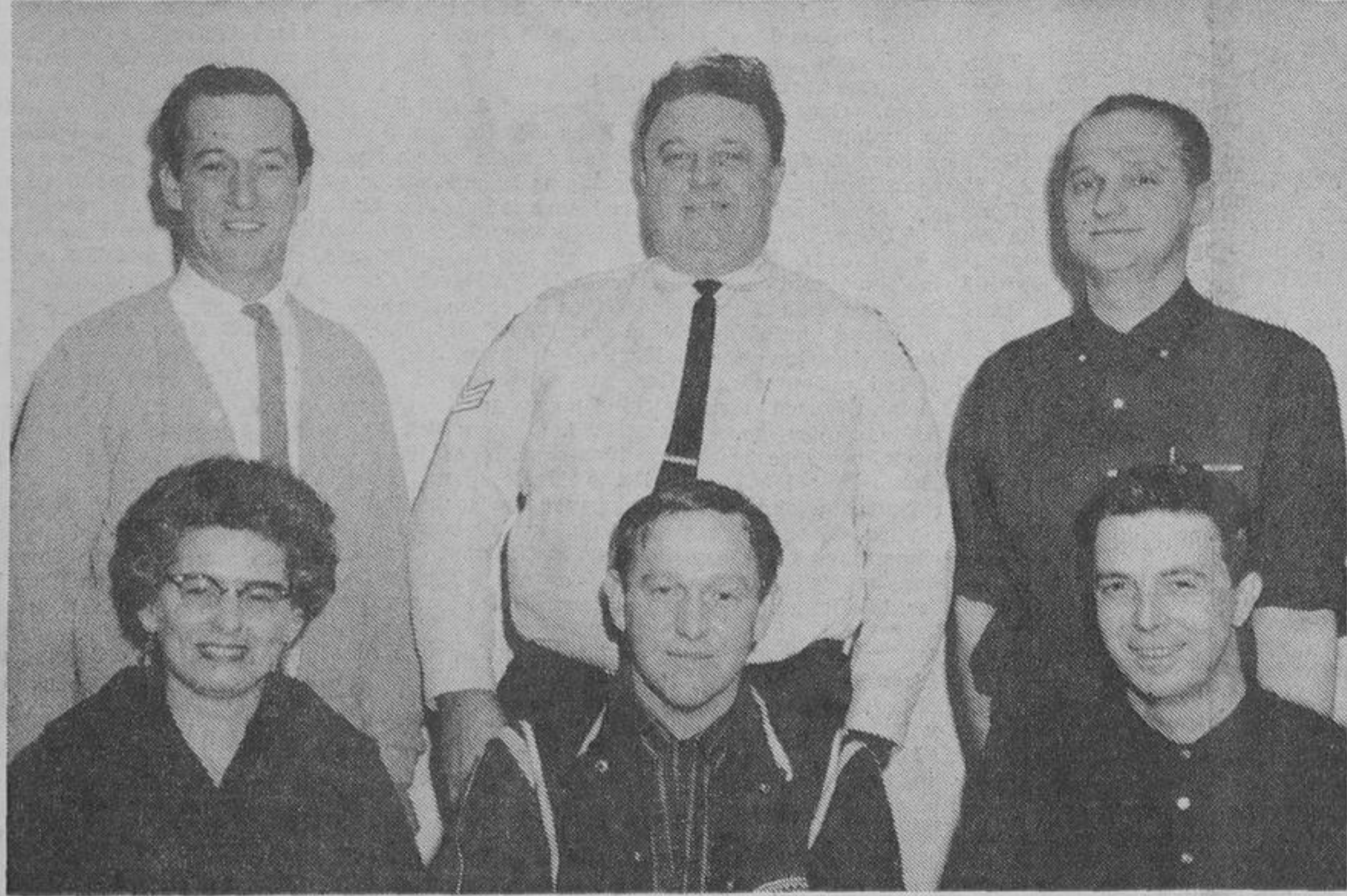
Two Richmond Hill members of the North York Badminton Club won the Toronto "C" Championship Ladies Doubles competition last week in the annual tournament.

I throw this in because there had been some rumors that Paul would be on the "hot seat" because of his comments re minor ball in this column a few weeks earlier.

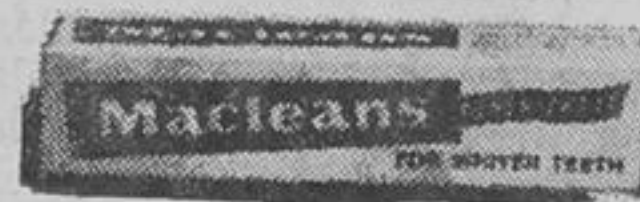
But he fended all questions with great aplomb and the entire meeting went along in businesslike and congenial fashion. It was a great success.

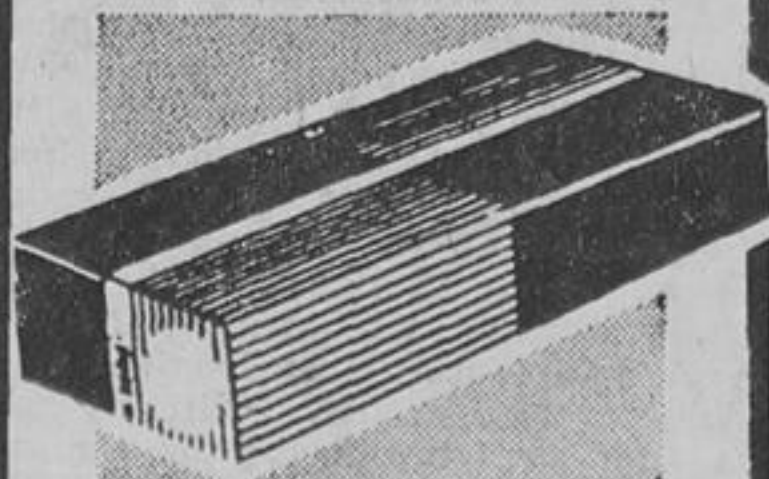
