Easter RELIGIOUS SERVICES

This weekend we celebrate the focal point of Christianity. Good Friday we recall that on that day 1967 years ago Christ died on the cross for our redemption. Joyfully we celebrate Easter with songs and exultation as we remember that He rose again from the dead. With prayers of gratitude for His gift of life eternal, reverently we will gather next Sunday in our churches and with families, friends and neighbors worship and rejoice.

ROMAN CATHOLIC
 Holy Week Services are continuing at Our Lady Queen of the World Church with High Mass, the Procession and the Reposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday at 7.30 p.m. At 9 p.m. the Adoration will begin and continue with every parishioner participating at stated times until 3 o'clock Good Friday afternoon.
 At 3 p.m. Good Friday the Liturgical Ceremonies and Holy Communion will begin. Rev. Father F. C. Robinson will be the narrator as the "Passion" is read. Rev. Father Peter Mason will be the "Voice of Christ" and "Voice of Hanna" will be the "Voice of the Synagogue." This is an innovation, in former years the "Passion" being read entirely by one priest.
 At 7 p.m. the Stations of the Cross will place emphasis on Christ's suffering today. "As long as a child is cold and hungry, Christ is suffering; as long as mothers are picking up dead sons on the battlefield, Christ is being crucified, and as long as social injustices are being perpetrated on humans, Christ is still being scourged," will be the basis of this emphasis.
 Easter Vigil Ceremonies will be held Holy Saturday at 8 p.m. with the Blessing of the Fire, the Baptismal Water and the Paschal Candle will be lighted and carried up the aisle of the darkened church. Chanting of the "Exultet" will be followed by the High Mass at which the bells will be rung and the organ will be heard.
 Masses will be held at the usual times Sunday. On Whitsunday a public baptism will be held during the 10.30 a.m. mass. This is another innovation which is creating much interest among the congregation.

All Holy Week services for St. Mary Immaculate Roman Catholic Church will be held at St. Mary Immaculate School on Trayburn Drive, as work proceeds on the steel framework of the beautiful new church rising on the Yonge-Dufferin site.
 Holy Thursday masses will be said at 11.30 a.m. and 6 p.m. and High Mass at 7.30 p.m.

Good Friday liturgical services will be held at 3 o'clock and the Stations of the Cross at 7.30 p.m.

Easter Vigil Ceremonies will begin at 10.45 p.m. Holy Saturday with the first Easter Mass at midnight. Other masses will be held Easter Sunday at 8, 9, 10.15, 11.30, 12.45 and 4 p.m.

 York Presbyterian United Church Women were well represented when 200 delegates and corresponding members met recently in St. Andrew's United Church Toronto for the fifth annual meeting of Toronto Conference U.C.W. The conference represents a membership of 29,089 women. Mrs. J. C. Marquis, president was in the chair.
 One of several highlight speakers was former Finance Minister Donald Fleming, chairman general council commission on world missions. It was with depth of feeling that he presented his plea for missions. He said, "This ecclesiastical pride that divides churches, harboring enmities, resentments, jealousies, is a blight on Christianity — the mission to the world is not our mission, it is God's mission and we must witness in the world." He reminded them that less than one cent per day per member was given to missions. We cannot be smug in the face of this indictment. "The church must be flexible, a church without a sense of mission is not a Christian church. There can be no participation in Christ without participation in missions."
 Mr. Fleming said that in Nigeria he was startled to hear in his introduction these words, "Here is the love of God that He has made us all brothers."
 The three-day program was varied and well balanced, inspirational, educational and speeded with fellowship and fun.
 U.C.W. groups are big business in more than finance. They are big in the promotion of welfare they feed the hungry, clothe the naked and comfort the homeless while realizing that need never ends. They are big in their willingness to learn, to change their accustomed way of thinking and meet current levels of thought embraced by their Christian beliefs. To contribute to home and world needs this one conference raised, in 1966, \$985,596.41 but it is not enough to meet the calls for help.
 In group sessions, "Meet the Experts" concerns of today generated discussion of why and how U.C.W. were concerned.
 On May 31 Toronto Conference Women will be hostesses at the hospitality pavilion at Expo.

4-H Club Innovations Include Maple Trees, Summer School

There will be several new features this year in 4-H Club work in York County.
 All members will be given two well-started maple trees to plant at their homes to mark Canada's Centennial year.
 A special farm school for 4-H members will be held in the summer. The young people will be bused to Newmarket for a three-day course. As well as learning sessions, the school will feature lots of visits to farms in the district.
 A lot of the emphasis on competition will be removed this year. Emphasis will be placed instead on completion of the project and prizes will be based almost entirely on the member finishing his project satisfactorily.
 Clubs for boys and girls from farms in York County will be organized in Easter week. Calf clubs for both beef and dairy cattle are the most popular, but there will also be clubs for young people interested in grain, corn and farm machinery.
 This is a very good year for new members to start. Agricultural Representative A. A. Wall will be glad to send full details on request, or better still, he recommends the young people get in touch with any one of the 4-H leaders. They are Hank VanderPost at King, Carl Boynton at Nobleton, Bruce Fieldhouse at Woodbridge, Jim Darlington at Maple, Elmer Pemberton at Richmond Hill; and the following all in Markham Township — Lester Weatherill, Don Brodie, Alex Davidson, Stuart Watson, Gerald Mann and Elson Miles.
