tirely by October of this year, he said, some of them before that time. It would take some time to get the Thackeray Site ready, he said, and there was therefore great urgency to deal with the matter.

Mr. Kennedy rejected however, Mr. Mace's contention that Vaughan had unconditionally rejected the extension of the Thackeray Site. "If the township had said it would not consider a site anywhere in the township, there would be no argument, a hearing would be necessary," he said. He also reminded Mr. Mace that Vaughan had not been given all the facts on which to approve or disapprove the site.

Automobile Licence Imprint Good As Fingerprint

James Waddington, 28, of North York, who left his calling card in the form of a licence plate imprint when he robbed a Markham refrigeration company, was sentenced to six months in jail last week in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court. However, he's going to receive help from the same firm in making restitution.

Henry Manson, of Maple, general manager of the company, said that Mrs. Waddington, wife of the accused, had been hired and was proving to be an excellent employee. "We needed someone with her capabilities and the plan is working fine," he said.

Waddington, who was convicted two weeks ago by Magistrate Russell Pearse on two charges of breaking and entering, took \$1,700 worth of copper tubing from the firm and got \$130 for it as scrap.

When police investigated they found the reverse imprint of a car licence plate in a snowbank, which Waddington had run into while turning his car around behind the plant.

Last week he told the court the loss of a child two years ago had started him drinking, and it was while engaged in one of his drinking bouts, he had made plans for the robbery.

Mkm Twp Vetoes Flag Day Holiday

Markham Township Council Monday afternoon agreed to make March 27 (Easter Monday) a holiday in the township, but turned down a request from Ancaster Township Council to institute another holiday.

The resolution from Ancaster called for the proclaiming of the Monday nearest to February 15 as Flag Day, to be observed as a holiday throughout Canada.

In its letter to council, the Ancaster group said February 15 was the anniversary of Canada's new flag, and suggested the day be set aside for a program of winter sports in Canada.

The resolution will be sent to Prime Minister Lester Pearson.

Councillor Allan Summer moved that council back the resolution, but failed to receive a seconder.

Both Deputy-reeve S. J. Gadsby and Councillor Anthony Roman were absent from council.

Council also received a letter from York Central District High School Board setting out its proposed budget for 1967, and moved that it be received for study.

M. Anderson Graduates Will Go To Venezuela

Myrna Anderson, well-known in Richmond Hill, having many friends and relatives here, graduated March 12 from the Watchtower Bible School of Gilead in New York City, we are informed by Daniel Bonham, Allencourt. Miss Anderson completed a five-month specialized course in Bible instruction and missionary training and is being sent to Venezuela in South America on special assignment.

During the course academic studies included a chapter-by-chapter study of the Bible, the relation of world history to history of the Bible as well as Bible-teaching techniques. A very practical feature of the missionary training was intensive instruction in Spanish, French, Portuguese, Korean or Chinese. These studies were shared by a class of 103 selected ministers of Jehovah's Witnesses from 12 lands, who are now equipped to take their mission of peace to 29 different lands to which they have been assigned.

Students were also given an opportunity to study and participate in the United States Branch's supervision of its 5,314 congregations and 359 travelling ministerial supervisors. They also shared in operation of the society's printing plants where Bibles and the society's two magazines are printed.

"It was most impressive," Miss Anderson said, "to observe the force for peace that the Bible exerted in our close association with so many different nationalities and cultural backgrounds. We always enjoyed mutual understanding and peace with our fellow students and this emphasized to me that the nations of the world could peacefully coexist if the teachings of the Bible were only followed."
