modate anything else.
"It would go over as a welfare
housing project."
Reeve Rumble said that, when
the township got in \$60,000 or
\$70,000 more industrial assess-
ment, it could get more housing.
You can't keep housing out,
the reeve said.
Would a proper ratio of in-
dustrial assessment take care of
any new schools, which would
probably come about through
new housing.
"It will improve the situa-
tion," Mr. Rumble said. "As
long as you're going to build
new schools, you're going to
have some new costs."
"The only thing you can try
to do is to maintain some rea-
sonable progression."
"A zoo wouldn't bring in any
assessment, but it would be an
attraction for the area, and
would bring in more people,"
Reeve Rumble said.
Wouldn't all these people be
pretty hard on the roads?
"That's what roads are for,"
said the reeve.

Richmond Hill Area Hydro Staff Goes 3 Years Without Accident

No lost time accidents in more
than three years of continuous
work is the outstanding safety
record that the entire staff of
Ontario Hydro's Richmond Hill
Area has established.
The staff of 56 persons in-
cluding 22 linemen and fore-
sters; 12 meter readers, inspec-
tors, customer service repre-
sentatives; and 22 inside com-
mercial staff members have
worked more than 1,000 consec-
utive days without any injuries
that could cause them to take
time off. This represents a total
of approximately 301,570 man-
hours of work that is acci-
dent free.
Richmond Hill area covers a
territory of some 280 square
miles and includes rural and
suburban sectors with a total
of 11,000 customers. The power
load in Richmond Hill Area
amounts to 38,600 kilowatts and
the staff has 323 miles of trans-
mission, sub-transmission and
distribution lines to maintain.
Because of the sometimes
hazardous nature of the work,
the record of over 1,000 acci-
dent-free days accomplished by
Richmond Hill Area staff is
quite significant. Linemen and
foresters are called out in all
kinds of weather and especially
during severe ice storms and
wind or electrical storms to
make certain that electric power
service is maintained to cus-
tomers. This requires great care
when conditions are extremely

Town Council Praises James Ryan, Turns Down Ontario Humane Society

Canine Control Officer James
Ryan came in for commenda-
tion on his efforts Monday night
by members of Richmond Hill
Council.
Mr. Ryan was appearing to
present an annual report which
dealt at great length about the
problems presented by cats and
the fact that "I have no legal
right to pick up cats or hold
them for three days."
He stated there was "absolu-
tely no legislation pertaining
to cats. I hope that your coun-
cil and others and the province
will study this question particu-
larly in view of the high rabies
rate."
Council agreed to draft a
motion asking that the Depart-
ment of Municipal Affairs
study the "cat" problem and
provide some type of control or
impounding law.

In other related business,
Council approved a fire, ambu-
lance and bylaws committee
recommendation that the town
does "not wish to enter into an
agreement with the Ontario Hu-
mane Society at this time as we
are completely satisfied with
the service of Mr. Ryan."
Councillor Lois Hancey, chair-
man of the committee, told
for us to pick them up and
hold them for a three-day
period and following that
take any steps necessary.

Council agreed to draft a
motion asking that the Depart-
ment of Municipal Affairs
study the "cat" problem and

A few weeks ago a proposal
was made to the councils of

to take over dog control in the
aforementioned municipalities.
The society's proposals were

Hill.
