A mardi gras at Regis College is taking place this Friday and promises to be a real fun evening. The committee has worked very hard to make this a successful party and is hoping for a large attendance.

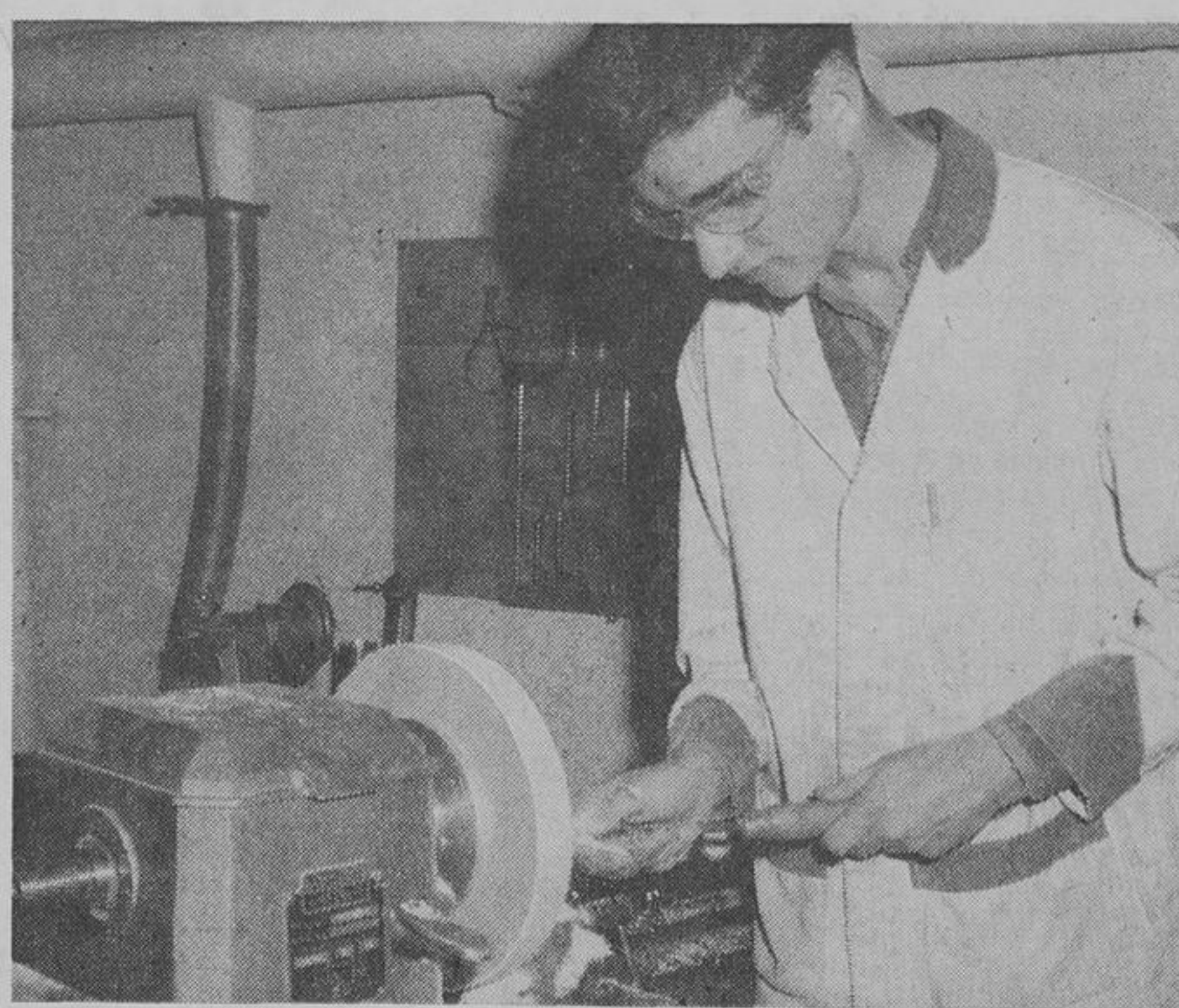
Games of chance, discotheque, crazy photos, a bottle booth and bars set up for the evening are a few of the many surprises in store for those planning to attend.
