

### Exhibition Track Meet At Langstaff

It looks like a photo-finish to the senior girls' 60 yard dash at the inter-school track and field meet at Langstaff Secondary School May 4. However, A. Wright of Woodbridge was judged the winner, Pia Schenk of Bayview placed second and Elaine Heaton of Langstaff was

Langstaff came out on top with 98 points at the meet, Bayview second with 95 and Woodbridge third with 87. Bayview topped both junior and senior boys' events, while Langstaff was junior girls' winner and Woodbridge senior girls'.

Some outstanding boys' performances were Langstaff's Joe Solski in the senior javelin, 152 ft. 10 inches; Woodbridge's Dave Chapman, 40 ft. six inches in the senior triple jump; Bill George, also of Woodbridge, 5 ft. 10 inches in the senior high jump; Mike Leishman of Langstaff, 41 ft. six inches in the senior shot put; Bob Bailie, Langstaff, 40 ft. two inches in the junior shot put; Tom Stoyan, Langstaff who ran the senior 440 in 55 seconds and Ken Hamilton, Bayview who ran the senior mile in four minutes, 32 seconds.

The only remaining TSA 1 children in Vaughan schools will be four at Charles Howitt.

The third school will be necessary if approval is given to the Selkirk Subdivision, north of the Wimpey Subdivision. However, if it appears that this will be unduly delayed, additions may be built to the other two schools in the area.




