Mackillop Pupils Tell Canada's Story In Displays, Music

A short play based on an incident at Beaver Dam in the War of 1812, "The Drummer Boy", was the highlight of the Centennial evening at Mackillop Public School on May 11. The play was written by Frances Dalton, a grade 8 pupil in the school. It was amazingly well written, revealing a surprising maturity and sophistication for so young a playwright. The players were also grade 8 pupils, who presented a well-polished performance which held the complete attention of the audience in two performances.

The program developed the theme of the evening "This Is Our Country", which had been carried out throughout the entire school. It began with the singing of "O Canada" in French by the grades 7 and 8 choir conducted by Larry Halliday, continued through a stirring Centennial message by Jennifer Hunter of grade 6 to an inspirational speech on "Our Canadian Identity" by Ricky Hay.

The grades 7 and 8 choir conducted by Larry Halliday sang a group of Canadian songs which paid tribute to all parts of our Dominion as well as to the country as a whole, in perfect harmony. Mr. Halliday also supervised a tumbling display by boys and girls of grades 7 and 8, and Miss Donalds Westcott was responsible for a display of folk dancing which was enjoyed by both the audience and the dancers.

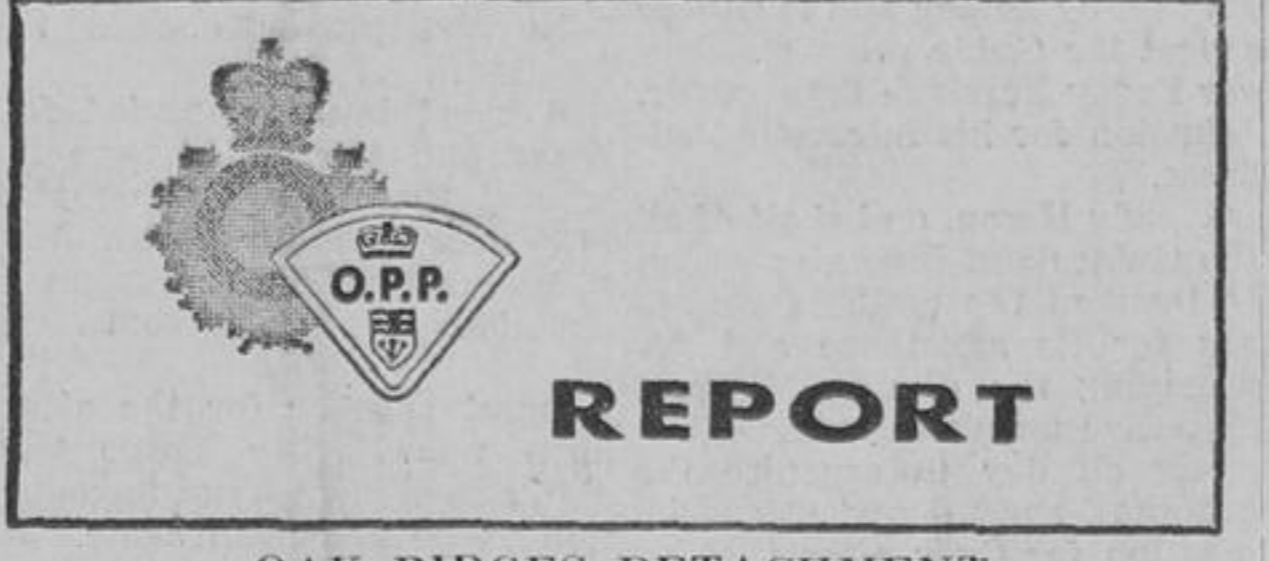
Miss Gwen Scott conducted the grades 5 and 6 choir in 3 Canadian songs and both choirs combined to sing "The Emblem of Canada".

Classroom and corridor displays reflected the great amount of work and research which had gone into the study of Canada, its history, its present and future. English, social studies, geography, history, science, physical education, art and music had all been correlated to the theme. That this well-developed program has given the pupils of the school, from kindergarten to grade 8 a greater knowledge of Canada, a greater appreciation of their heritage and a pride in the fact they are Canadians, was very evident to all visitors.

Early Canadians, the Indians, Eskimos and the pioneers received much attention, with reproductions of their homes and their way of life in pictures and table-top displays, stories, charts and books. A teepee had been built in one room, an ox-cart and oxen in another. Canadian animals, birds and flowers were featured in other rooms. The provinces were depicted in charts, products, stories in one classroom and portraits of the Fathers of Confederation were features of another display.

A grade 7 class compared Canadian education in 1867 and 1967, government at all levels

had been studied by a grade 8 class; Centennial scrapbooks, historical research, fur trapping and logging, Canadian scenes and a miniature museum were found in other classrooms. A very topical display was the Expo circus built by a grade 4 class and a grade 6 class presented a frontier drama featuring cowboys and Indians. The imagination of the five-year-olds was evident in one kindergarten classroom where bridges, buildings of the past, present and future, sail boats, freighters, airports and statues had been assembled from bits of scrap lumber and cardboard boxes. These youngsters show promise of being the expert designers and builders of Canada's future. The other kindergarten display featured Canada yesterday and today and a farm and pet shop.

One man was injured in a three-car collision at Highways 7 and 27, May 11.

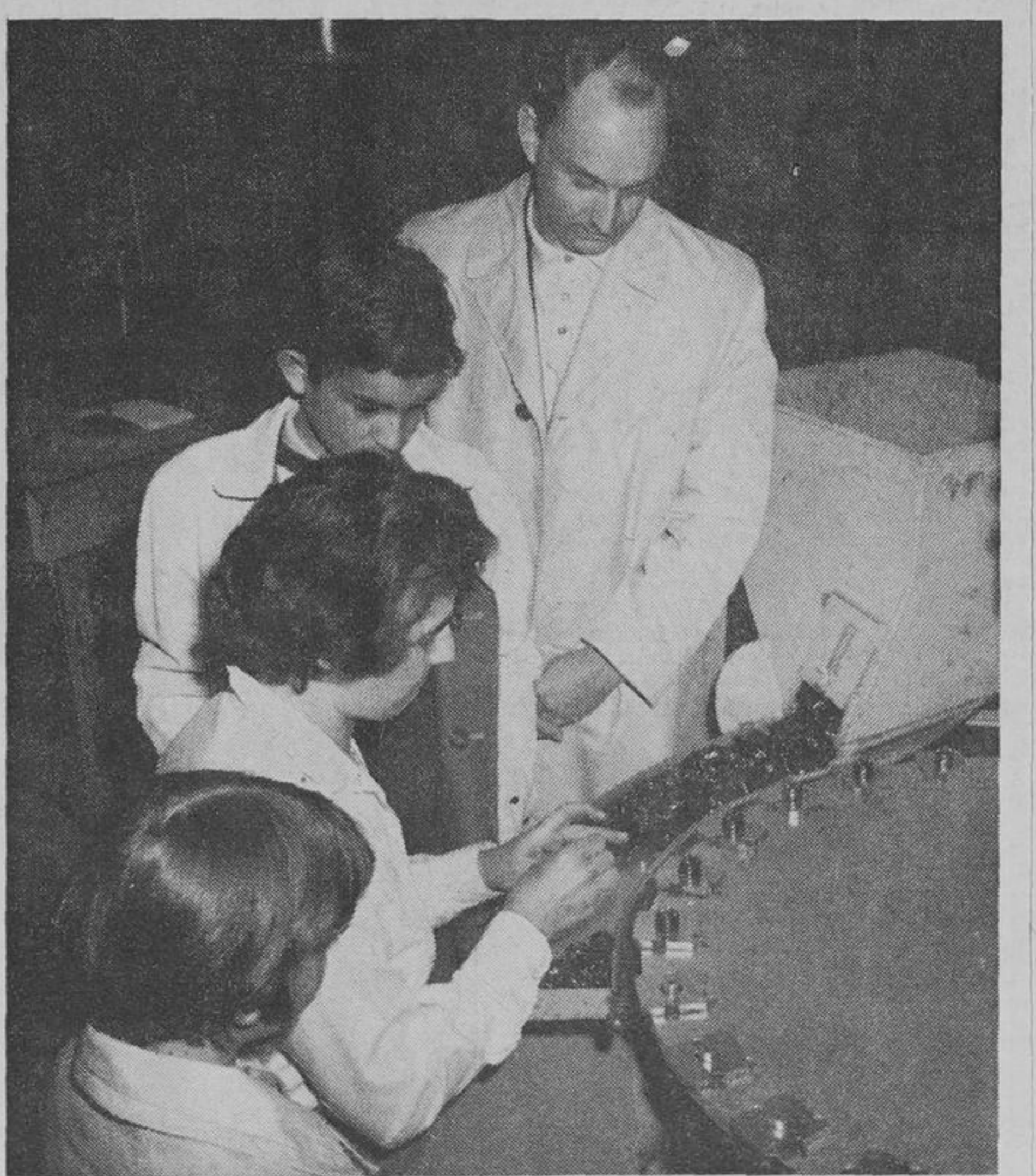
