Parking Ban Could Drive Stores

(Continued from Page 1) better than searching for a parking spot up and down the street as I've done myself."

Mr. Bacon said the Yonge reconstruction was being financed 90 percent by the province and "is a highway and can't be a suitable one if parking is allowed. It will be overloaded even with four lanes. You're going to have to have parking off the street sooner or later."

Mr. Taylor said he agreed with most of what was said but was concerned that the off-street parking would not be available.

"You've set an arbitrary date of January 1, 1969," he said, "but there has been no indication of any start on off-street parking or how it will be accomplished and how soon."

He said that it was up to the town to initiate the project and "from what we can gather the town has no money to do this. And until these lots are in existence with the proper access and paved it seems to me any banning of parking is premature."

Mr. Broadhurst said it was better to set a date rather than wait until the last moment and then move. If you have a deadline it encourages action. Otherwise these things would drag on and on."

Mr. Taylor emphasized that he and others were still opposed to a total banning of parking on Yonge even with off-street parking and received support from several members of council.

Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins said he "could not go along with a complete ban on all parking."

He suggested some form of parking restrictions could be worked out during the business rush hours.

"There is no problem at night," he said, "except perhaps during the winter with snow removal. Something could be worked out to allow parking on either side at least half a day."

Reeve Donald Plaxton said he also had misgivings about a total ban and thought that the main need for "no parking" would be during the peak hours.

He said the future of the Yonge Street development depended on the "type of redevelopment we get. If it is mainly offices then I can see the problem decreasing. But until then I don't think we can impose an arbitrary parking ban because there is the question of whether our local merchants can survive."

Councillor Ivan Mansbridge said he was in favor of "complete banning if sufficient off-street parking can be provided. But I could possibly change my mind on the matter."

Councillor Lois Hancey said she had been concerned about "no parking on Yonge Street without any study on the cost of off-street parking and had asked council on numerous occasions for this information. But no one seemed to get upset until tonight. I've been extremely concerned."

She said there should have been "some type of recommendation from the transportation committee already on off-street parking and the problems involved in providing it."

Transportation Committee Chairman Mansbridge and member Reeve Plaxton pointed out they had been unaware of just how far they could go in establishing costs.

"But if we can borrow staff members from the planning department to establish what is needed we'll be glad to provide facts and figures"

Mr. Bacon suggested that the committee could meet with one from the businessmen who would be required to provide information on property available and for what terms, etc. It was decided to leave the matter with the transportation committee, which would meet with representatives from the businessmen re off-street parking acquisitions.
