Registrations Down August Swim Classes

A child who has successfully completed the beginners' classes at Richmond Hill Centennial Swimming Pool, has taken the first step towards becoming an accomplished swimmer, but only the first step, cautions Paul Wilson, pool manager.



swimmers, able to save themselves and others if the need arises.

"The beginners' classes teach the youngsters the very elementary skills on which to build more advanced swimming skills," Manager Wilson states. These elementary skills include the ability to swim 40 feet on the front and 20 feet on the back, to tread water for 30 seconds, bobbing, to open the eyes under water, to do the jellyfish flat, to float on the front, roll to the back and roll back to the front. Many children acquire these skills in one two week session, others require two sessions. If they fail to acquire the necessary competence in one session, they are advised to wait another year before taking the second session,

until their bodies are more developed.

Charge for the two-week swimming instruction is \$7 for the first child and \$6 for each additional child up to a total of \$23.

Season's tickets will be on sale at half price, starting August 1, for the remainder of the season. Children's will sell at \$3, students' at \$4.50 and adults at \$6.25.

With hot weather attendance at the pool should pick up, and the family swimming hour Saturdays and Sundays from 5 to 6:30 is already reflecting this trend. But even in cool weather, the pool is always comfortable — the water is heated to approximately 78 degrees. (Anyone wishing further information is asked to phone the pool office, at 884-6651.

The visitors opened the scoring in the second inning when Wayne Davidson singled, moved to third on a double by Billy Drennen and scored as Don Blowe fled to centre. The lead was extended to 2-0 in the top of the fifth when Joe O'Neill singled and was cashed on a double by Tom Trevelyan.

The Clothiers counted one in the bottom of the fifth as Bob Shelston reached base on a Scarborough error and scored on a double by Centrefielder Larry Kelson.

Scarboro added single runs in the sixth and seventh to take a 4-1 lead. A misjudged fly to right field by Al Russell turned into a triple and he scored on an infield out. Lyle Shaver drove home O'Neill, who had walked, for Scarborough's final run.

Kents fought back in the eighth for the three runs necessary to produce the tie. Singles by Kelson and Shelston combined with a walk to Clayton Chapman and a throwing error by Scarborough's Mike Kitson did the damage.

Assistant Coach Bob Shelston was called into action and pitched a fine seven hitter and was rather unfortunate to gain only a tie. Two spectacular catches by Scarborough outfielders Drennen and Dorion cut Kent rallies off in the early innings.

Trevelyan went eight innings for Scarborough and Drennen pitched the ninth. Kent's also counted seven hits off the combined offerings. Kelson, only Kent batsman to get more than one hit, had three.

July 20 Kents visited Roding Park, home diamond of Beverley Hills Hotel, by scoring a 5-3 win moved out of the cellar and ahead of the hotelmen in the standings
