

**Local Lawn Bowlers Scuba Divers Stress Win Addison Trophy Importance Of Safety**

On July 26 at Stouffville, a Richmond Hill rink of lawn bowlers won the John Addison Trophy in a men's trebles tournament.

He said it was the intention of the OUC to see that all its members were well instructed in this department, and to provide safety programs for all those interested.

He said he hoped scuba divers would adhere carefully to all the rules of underwater safety, before it became a matter of legislating against the pastime, as had happened at the west coast.

The four-day convention in Toronto will feature an underwater photography contest and underwater film festival, as well as top speakers active in underwater diving and research.

**Ball and Maver Win Shirts Kent Clothes Split With Dobbys Win Tuesday 4-2, Lose Wed. 7-4**

July 25 at their temporary home, Goulding Park in North York, Kent Clothes Juniors extended their unbeaten streak to four games by downing Dobbys' Sports of Willowdale by a 4-2 count.

The Clothiers did all their damage early and held a 4-1 lead at the end of two innings. The remainder of the game developed into a pitcher's duel between Dobbys' Gary Peck and Kents' Rodger Ball.

Dobbys scored in the top half of the first when Catcher Resto Rossi ended up on third with a triple as four Kent players allowed his high pop behind second base to drop in between them. Jimmy Bannatyne cashed him with a single.

Kents came back with a vengeance in the bottom of the first and grabbed the lead which they never relinquished. Jack Dubkowski lined a long home run down the left field foul line to tie the score. Larry Moore singled, stole second and crossed the plate on Ball's single.

The locals added two more in the second and settled back to successfully defend their margin for the remainder of the game behind Ball's effective five-hit pitching. Ron McDonald was hit by Dobbys' starter and loser, Rick Parnes, and Bob Grayer walked. Parnes was lifted in favor of Peck who was greeted by a two run single by John Maver. McDonald and Grayer had advanced on a passed ball.

Dobbys combined singles by

Ray O'Quinn and Peck plus a passed ball to score the final run of the game in the fifth. The latter stages of the game were featured by tight pitching and a spectacular running catch by Kent Centre Fielder Larry Kelson, who robbed Rossi of an almost certain extra base knock.

Stars of the game, as selected by pleased sponsor Marv Meretsky, were Ball and Maver, who each received a shirt for their fine efforts.

It didn't take Dobbys long to grab the lead — during the second inning they combined three singles by Gary Marsh, Ross Armour and Barry Jamieson and a home run by Harry Hamill with a Kent error for five runs. They added their final pair in the sixth when Peter Coates walked and Ray O'Quinn slapped a homer.

Both starting pitchers went the distance. Winner Jamieson was hit freely but managed to scatter them well. Loser Larry Moore was not hit as often but the blows against him came in bunches which caused his defeat. He allowed only one hit outside of the second and sixth innings. Clark and McDonald had three hits for the local team. Pitcher Moore added a pair.
