"We intend to make this an annual event in Richmond Hill," Mr. Chapman said. "It will be the first of its kind in Canada."

During the three-day event the visiting players will be accommodated as far as possible at the homes of town residents. Accompanying parents and other guests will be expected to find their own accommodations.

The 1-0 game was a classic pitcher's duel. Judd struck out 32 Chester batters over the 14 inning distance while Domik fanned 25 Jeweller hopefuls. Judd gave up two hits while Domik was tagged for seven safeties.

In the second contest it was Judd whiffing 21 batsmen and Domik taking care of 10. Quite a pitching duel. He's been a little luckier in the hitting end of it having whacked out a couple of homeruns off the same Mr. Judd.
