# Thornhill Pair Complete World Tour

Mr. and Mrs. J. D. McGhee, 140 Centre Street, completed an exciting world tour August 2 that flew them to every country in the world with the exception of Hungary, Czechoslovakia and Austria. The McGhees began their trip June 29, 1966 when they flew to Ireland, spent a month in Scotland including the Orkney Islands and another month travelling from the north to the south of England.

After leaving the British Isles, Mr. and Mrs. McGhee flew to Russia to spend 18 days on a tour of Leningrad, Moscow, Volodga, Kiev, Rostov and Sofia. Mrs. McGhee was the lone woman on the tour in the company of seven men. The McGhees were well looked after in Russia but found the shops disappointing and drab, devoid of any window displays.

Mrs. McGhee commented on how hard the women work in Russia. One Sunday they were working on the railway tracks while the men lounged in the trucks. The visitors viewed many beautiful old cathedrals but were saddened to see them used now strictly as science museums.

The McGhees had a three month Eurorail pass for travelling in Europe that entitled them to travel first class with no set time schedule. The especially enjoyed Switzerland and the beauties of Monaco in their travels.

They visited Spain, journeyed to Gibraltar by boat and spent a few days in North Africa where they visited Casablanca and saw the famous bazars full of rather sinister looking characters. Christmas was spent in Rome and New Year's was celebrated in Venice where it was cold and damp at that time of the year. From Italy the travellers flew to Turkey, Syria, Jordan, Lebanon and Israel. They found Israel to be a lovely country and were most impressed with the tour of the Sea of Galilee. Here a history teacher and son of a rabbi was their guide. He was most interesting and well informed and brought the Old and New Testaments vividly to life. Travelling across the Israel border into Egypt is forbidden so the McGhees flew to Cyprus and then to Cairo where they saw the famous pyramids and landmarks of the Arab country. A much looked-forward-to reunion with their son Jim in Africa was next on the McGhees' schedule. Jim has been teaching and doing research work in bacteriology in Kabeta, six miles from Nairobi in Kenya, for the past two years with CUSO, Canadian University Services Overseas. He will be returning to Canada in six months' time after completing his work there.

The McGhees then flew to Johannesburg accompanied by Jim and rented a car and drove 2,700 miles in South Africa. They toured the east side of the country and completed the trip with a visit to Durban and Cape Town before flying back to Nairobi on April 1st. They spent a month with their son altogether.

Here Mr. and Mrs. McGhee said farewell to Jim and boarded a flight for India. They visited Bombay, Calcutta and Delhi and generally found the country to be a beautiful place. Poverty is everywhere in India, they said, with people huddled on the streets at night, naked children everywhere and beggars a constant problem to the tourists. They visited Ceylon, flew to Calcutta and then on to Rangoon for a 24-hour visit, the maximum time allotted to visits.

Reservations were difficult to obtain on the flight to Burma even though the plane was almost empty when they boarded it, with only seven passengers. In Rangoon the people were celebrating their New Year's with a strange custom of throwing water at every passerby. Mrs. McGhee had the unfortunate experience of having a pail of water poured over her as she walked down the street. Everything was flooded as trucks were kept busy hosing the streets.

Highlight of the trip was a visit to Bangkok, Singapore and several delightful smaller places in Malaya.

Eight days of the world tour were spent in China where the McGhees with their guide visited Canton and Peking. Signs of Mao were plastered everywhere. They attended a drama in Peking full of propaganda directed against the United States, a country the Chinese obviously despise. No cars were seen in China where the people travel on bicycles. The community farms were clean and tidy with rice growing in

abundance. Hotel accommodation was good in China and the tree lined streets very attractive.

A visit to the beautiful island of Taiwan with its lovely gardens was thoroughly enjoyed before the McGhees travelled to Japan.

The visitors found Japan to be a decorative and very pretty place and the people charming. Mr. and Mrs. McGhee visited Tokyo, Hiroshima and Nagasaki and went on a bus tour of the lovely cities in Japan and were touched to see the impressive memorials in the atom bombed cities. The Japanese people definitely do not want another war, Mrs. McGhee said, they have seen enough of the disasters of war.

Next on the agenda was a visit to the Philippines where they toured Manila before leaving for Australia and New Zealand. They arrived during the winter season in Australia and found the country cold as they missed central heating and the comforts of home. They visited Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide, the planned city of Canberra and toured the northern coral reef where the temperatures were considerably warmer. A delightful few days were spent in the Fiji Islands and Tahiti before the McGhees flew to Mexico, Miami and home to Canada.

An interesting note is that Mr. and Mrs. McGhee travelled with one suitcase apiece for their 14 month, round-the-world trip. They had a marvellous time and will remember their adventure for many years to come.

The trip had an unfortunate ending when Mr. McGhee became ill on arriving home. He is believed to have contracted an infection in Mexico that later developed into acute arthritis. He has been in York Central Hospital for the past few weeks but at this writing is now showing improvement and hopes to be home in the very near future.

# Murder Hearing Set For October
