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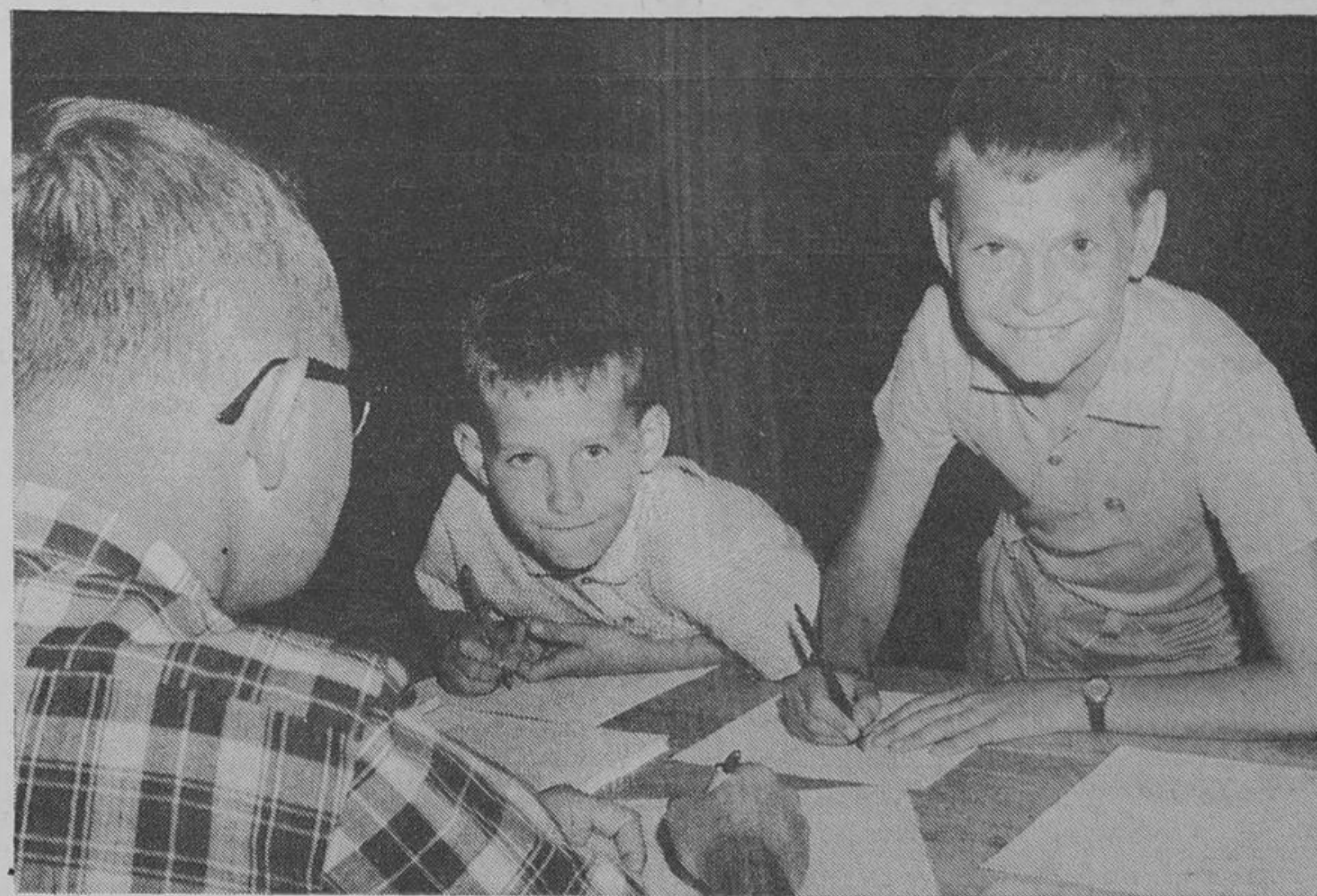

## Seek New Survey

### Keele Parking Ban Is Opposed By Merchants

A group representing most of the business establishments in Maple appeared at last week's meeting of Vaughan Township Council to protest a proposed parking ban on Keele Street between the hours of 7 am and 7 pm.

The township's works committee headed by Maple Councillor Dalton McArthur had recommended such a ban in its report to council and in fact a bylaw had been prepared and was to be passed at Monday's meeting, prohibiting parking during those hours.

Previously, council had considered, and at one time was prepared to pass, a bylaw banning parking on the newly-reconstructed

Keele Street 24 hours. This was strenuously opposed by several residents who felt that their friends should be able to park in front of their homes during the evening.

The businessmen feel that their firms will suffer from a parking ban during daylight hours. As a result, council agreed to ask the Ontario Department of Transport to make a study of the situation with a view to establishing parking regulations. The department previously did a study of the intersection of Keele Street and Maple Road (Richmond Street) and said that a crossing guard was not necessary at the intersection.
