Good Weather Brings 20% Harvest Of Deer

Hunters had almost perfect weather during the three-day open deer season, November 6. 7 and 8 in sections of the Lake Simcoe District. A light fall of snow made tracking easy and temperatures a few degrees above freezing were not hard to take and a distinct contrast to the fog and rain of the past two years.

Approximately 1,000 hunters were checked by conservation officers during the hunt, the Department of Lands and Forests reports. Data sought was age, sex, harvest and number of days hunted. Hunter success dropped in some of the 17 townships but was good in two new townships, Oro and Medonte, which were open for the first time this year. In these two townships success ran at approximately 20%. A few deer, field dressed in the 51/2 to 61/2 years class weighed in at about 215 pounds.

Local resident hunters were out in force. Officers checked several violations, chiefly in connection with use of rifles and unplugged shotguns. One gun accident was reported.
