

Good Weather Brings 20% Harvest Of Deer

Hunters had almost perfect weather during the three-day open deer season, November 6, 7 and 8 in sections of the Lake Simcoe District. A light fall of snow made tracking easy and temperatures a few degrees above freezing were not hard to take and a distinct contrast to the fog and rain of the past two years.

Approximately 1,000 hunters were checked by conservation officers during the hunt, the Department of Lands and Forests reports. Data sought was age, sex, harvest and number of days hunted. Hunter success dropped in some of the 17 townships but was good in two new townships, Oro and Medonte, which were open for the first time this year. In these two townships success ran at approximately 20%. A few deer, field dressed in the 5½ to 6½ years class weighed in at about 215 pounds.

Local resident hunters were out in force. Officers checked several violations, chiefly in connection with use of rifles and unplugged shotguns. One gun accident was reported.

right back at 15:10 to put Richmond Hill back in the lead again. Assists went to Tom Kelly and Doug Stubbs.

Charlie Gruber tied it for Toronto at 17:32 of the first period and Dunnett put them ahead 3-2 at 4:03 of the second period.

Doug McInnis made it 3-3 at 13:01 from Paul Foy.

The Jewellers came out flying in the third period as Stubbs took just 26 seconds to score from Kelly. The rush was on.

Foy made it 5-3 at 7:18 from McInnis.

Bob Gibson laced the puck home at 14:50 from Chapman and McInnis; Herb Brodski at 16:43 from Stubbs and Kelly; and Gibson from Matt Kinnari at 17:59 to round out Richmond Hill's scoring.

Willowdale Rangers appeared to be on their way to an easy win as they built up a 3-0 lead into the third period only to see the Comets rap home four goals. The Rangers managed a tie on the strength of one goal in that same period.

Fred Disera opened the scoring at 18:22 of the first period assisted by John Geniols and Ian Slater.

Dave MacInnis made it 2-0 at the 29 second mark of the

middle period from Earl Cairns and Dave Turgeon. It was 3-0 at 17:45 as Jackie Robeson put the puck home from Bill Buterman and Slater.

The third period saw the Comets take fire as Leo DeRocher scored at 9:50 from Glen Cliffe and Ivan Denike; Norm McDonald at 11:15 from Paul Smith and Howie Laten; DeRocher again at 12:27 unassisted to tie the game at 3-3.

The stunned Rangers rallied to take the lead briefly at 14:45 as Robeson managed an unassisted goal. But Calvin George tied it at 17:25 from DeRocher and Cliffe and that's the way it ended.
