Receives Award

Officer-In-Charge of the Forest Pathology Laboratory at Maple since its opening in the fall of 1953, Dr. L. T. White, Longbridge Road, Thornhill, was honored recently on the completion of 30 years in the public service of Canada. Dr. White received a long service award in the form of a lapel pin and a scroll. Born in Pembroke, he received his forestry degree from the University of Toronto, bachelor and master of arts degrees from the University of Western Ontario and his doctorate from the University of Toronto. Dr. White served in government research posts at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Fredericton before his posting to the Toronto area in 1946. During the years 1942 to 1945 he served overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force.

An appointee of York County Council, Dr. White has served on York Central District High School Board since 1963. The forest pathology laboratory which Dr. White heads is being moved to the new Department of Forestry and Rural Development headquarters in Sault Ste. Marie. The disease survey department moved there this past summer but approximately 30 employees still remain at Maple. The entire move is to be completed by October, 1968.

Kaleidoscope

How do YOU feel about long-hair music? No, not Monkees-type long-hair music. Symphonic music. Like Mozart, Beethoven, Handel and, yes, even the Beatles' "Yesterday." Well, if you really don't know much about symphonic music, if you're not sure how you feel about it, there are several ways of finding out. Among them, I'd recommend going to hear our own symphony orchestra. Its name is quite simply "Richmond Hill Symphony Orchestra." What it achieves is not so simple. It has earned justly its considerable reputation for making music well. When and how did it all happen?

Check back through past issues of "The Liberal" until you come to December 1, 1961, and the headline: "Symphony Group Seen In Public For The First Time". This was the beginning. It was not till September of the following year that the Richmond Hill Symphony Orchestra was officially launched with twenty-four musicians led by Conductor Arthur Burgin. Today, Mr. Burgin still leads the orchestra, but the original twenty-four has grown now to sixty-three members.

A striking characteristic of music-making in our day is the youth, vigor and talent of many performers. The Richmond Hill Symphony Orchestra is no exception. A third of its musicians are young people we know well from school and other associations: Paul Van Goozen, Doug Sparkes, Brian Taylor, Ron Robbins and Brian Burgin, to mention a few. There are others like them, young people who have left school, who enjoyed making music in such ways as the school orchestra or in their own groups, and who wish to continue what proved to be an enjoyable experience.

Personally, I'm glad they've decided to enrich the texture of our life here in the Hill by turning out for our own orchestra.

And this brings me to another point of very real concern. There are still a few openings in some sections of the orchestra, but attracting enthusiastic instrumentalists is not the real problem. The REAL PROBLEM is the audience. Not that symphony concert audiences are noisy, unmannerly or inconsiderate. No, it's just that too few people turn out to enjoy and support their orchestra.

Here we have a remarkably fine symphony orchestra praised by knowledgeable critics as "epitomizing the best aspects of amateur music-making." In past years, they got our interest and support, and they were used to playing for audiences of 300 to 500 people or more. "Now," says Mrs. Ann Sellen, President of the Symphony, "there are too often more people on the stage than in the audience."

This, I think, is a deplorable situation. It is something that I think we young people can do something about. We can support and encourage our very own symphony orchestra. We can urge our parents and their friends to do likewise. At the same time, we can learn to know and enjoy still another kind of "long-hair" music. Much of it has been around a long time and will probably still be around when some of the present "long-hair" music has been long consigned to history! See you at the next symphony concert!

OAK RIDGES DETACHMENT

Driver Faces Two Charges After Saturday Night Yonge St. Crash

Francis McMahon, 26, Cooksville has been charged with "careless driving" and "driving while disqualified", following an accident on Yonge St. just south of the Dominion Store, Saturday evening, the Oak Ridges Detachment of the OPP reports. Five persons were injured and rushed to York Central Hospital by ambulance.

Mr. McMahon, driving a convertible, was thrown 20 feet from his car when the top folded back part way during the impact. He suffered head and internal injury. His passenger, Carmen Lavereau, 20, also of Cooksville suffered injuries to her head and legs.

Driver of the second car involved was George James Goullie, 17, Newmarket. He suffered head injuries and his passengers, Ann Brewster, 15, and Marjory Brewster, 38, Aurora were also injured. Ann suffered injuries to her legs and Marjory received fractured ribs and injury to her arms and collarbone.

Richmond Hill Fire Department was called out to wash down the pavement which was covered with gasoline and debris. Time of the crash was 8:05 p.m.

Sunday at around 3:15 am a car driven by William John Uruski, 23, of Highway 7, Thornhill, was eastbound on Jefferson Sideroad and failed to stop at the intersection with Highway 11. It struck the earth embankment on the east side of Yonge and the driver suffered a fractured jaw and injury to his cheek.

 The six-year-old daughter of Mrs. Barbara Tracy, 21 Rosemary Avenue, Lake Wilcox, was rushed by police cruiser Monday morning to Newmarket Hospital for an emergency appendectomy. Both drivers suffered injury to heads and legs and were taken to York Central Hospital.

December 8 on Highway 7 near Mart Kenny's Ranch road, a car driven by Joseph Spitaro, 30, Rexdale, was struck by an eastbound car driven by Norma Webby, 48, RR 3 Bolton, which crossed the centre line and struck the westbound car. Driver of the second car suffered a dislocated jaw.
