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## Want More Rinks Accessible To All Town Children

Hancey is still fighting to have an outdoor skating rink provided in an accessible spot for the children in the area south of Markham Road, west of the CNR tracks. Ward 1 Councillor Ivan Mansbridge also continues to advocate outdoor rinks at

Last week council accepted a recommendation from its parks board made Nov-

The board recommends use of the old arena for free skating Tuesdays from 4 to 5:30 pm and Wednesdays from 1 to 3 pm. Crosby Park and the Mill Pond will be maintained for skating by parks board. Any other park or school area to be utilized for public skating will be prepared for flooding by the parks board and equipment made available to interested

> At the November 20 meeting Deputy-reeve Floyd Perkins moved that Walter Scott School be added to the list of ice surfaces to be flooded and maintained by the parks board. This motion was carried, but attempts by Councillor Hancey to have Lennox Park in her ward added and of Councillor Mansbridge to have Beverley Acres Public School included were unsuccessful.

Again last week both councillors returned to the battle, Mrs. Hancey making an impassioned plea for the children in the southern part of the town to whom the three open air rinks will not be accessible. Mr. Mans-

It was also unfortunate that when other municipalities were quoted as having discontinued outdoor natural ice rinks, it was not pointed out that they provide other recreation facilities such as ski tows and artificial snow and have a great number of neighborhood parks and city parks," said Mrs. Hancey.

Mayor Thomas Broadhurst pointed out that this was a decision of the parks board and council has approved it. He suggested that any recommended changes should be made to parks. "We have never had adequate use from these rinks," he claimed.
