Vaughan Outdoor School Is First In York County

York County's first outdoor learning centre, one of the few in the province outside of Metro, will be officially opened next Monday by Vaughan Township Public School Board at the old Burlington School north of Nashville.

Kindergarten and primary grade children will spend half days at the centre, while it is expected that all children in grade 4 to 8 will have spent a day there before the end of June.

Natural science instruction will be just one phase of the centre's function; it will be used to give concrete instruction in all subject areas.

Mackenzie Senior School Principal Malcolm McRoberts who is in charge of the project, advises that the century old building has been fitted with a good furnace and a variety of modern scientific equipment. ed out, "but most of them they can measure it off, centre.
