#### Oak Ridges History

"Windham" - the shortlived French settlement at Oak Ridges, is the subject of this week's historical article by Historian F. Doris FitzGerald of Thornhill, who is a frequent contributor to "The Liberal".

French Royalist emigres took up land along both sides of Yonge Street from Richmond Hill to Oak Ridges in 1798, cleared some land and built 18 homes. But by 1806 all but one had left the vicinity.
