The six inch watermain proposed for the project with an overall length of 14,675 feet was estimated at \$198,336, including service connections. The township's share of the cost would be \$46,936.

Owners' costs over 20 years at 634% interest are estimated at 56c per foot frontage, plus \$96 per water service connection. If connection costs are also amortized over 20 years, they would amount to \$8.89 per annum.
