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PEOPLE HAD BOILS IN BIBLICAL TIMES

They are often mentioned in the Bible. A boil's redness, swelling, local "hotness," and great tenderness as a fluid-filled core develops, gives a picture of a typical infection. Boils are usually caused by a staphylococci variety of bacteria which remains confined to the area of their entry.

It is called a boil when on the skin's surface, an abscess when it involves deep tissues. A carbuncle is a cluster of boils and a felon is a special type of boil affecting the thick tissues of the pad of a fingertip. Never squeeze a boil or a pimple. This spreads the infection. Diabetics, or patients with vascular disease, hardening of arteries or Burger's disease require immediate medical attention.

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
