Information sheets to be completed by the parents prior to the registration will be distributed to the homes through the schools. Any parent who has a child to enrol and does not receive a form should contact the principal of the school where the child will register. Classes will be organized on the basis of the information provided on these sheets.

Children enrolling in Grade 1 for September 1968 must have reached the age of five years on or before December 31, 1967. Children enrolling in kindergarten for September 1968 must have reached the age of four years on or before December 31, 1967. Proof of age of all children enrolling must be provided by the parents at the time of registration. Parents are also requested to provide immunization records for their children, so that a complete record will be available throughout their school career.

Transportation to and from school will be provided for Kindergarten children in parts of the township where transportation is normally provided for the children in other grades.
