It's Sugaring-Off Time

Miss Crowe's and Philip Wright's classes tapped 20 trees in the woodlot and by last Wednesday had collected approximately 15 gallons of sap. The sap was then hung to boil and students took turns stirring while the boys were kept busy gathering wood to keep the fire going. The syrup was then used to serve on pancakes made by older children at the school.

While the sap was collecting, the classes paid a visit to Amos Baker's sugar bush on the Langstaff Sideroad to see how syrup is produced commercially. They learned that it takes 50 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup.
