Police Accident Report

Three Car Pile-Up On Yonge St. Is Caused By A Tailgating Driver

Tailgating by a Toronto driver was the cause of an accident on Yonge Street South in Richmond Hill which involved three cars and more than \$800 in damages, April 20.

David Souter, 17, has been charged with following too close to a car driven by John Haldane, 25, of 219 Lennox Avenue, Richmond Hill. Souter was unable to stop his car in time and was involved in a rear-end collision with the Haldane car. The force of the impact pushed the Haldane automobile into the rear of another car driven by Erling Nielsen, 48, of Oak Ridges, which had stopped for a turning car.

Richmond Hill Police have also charged Irene Bishop, 29, RR 2, Aurora, with failing to yield the right of way at the intersection of Trayborn Drive and Yonge Street, April 20. Mrs. Bishop was involved in a collision with a car driven by

Isabella Toyne, 38, of Humber Summit. Damage to the vehicles was estimated at \$650.

Carl Cross, 40, of Concession 4, Whitchurch, has been charged with careless driving following an accident on Bayview Avenue, north of the Markham Sideroad, April 18.

Cross pulled sharply into the driving lane on Bayview Avenue causing a collision with a car driven by Richard Hobeck, 23, of Concession 8, Innisfil. Damage to the vehicles was estimated at some \$700.

Markham Township Police have charged Frank Thivierge, 64, of Aurora with making an improper turn following an accident on Don Mills Road at the Stouffville-Gormley Townline. Mr. Thivierge was involved in a collision with a car driven by John McGuey, 62, of Bowmanville, Sunday afternoon.

Six passengers and the two drivers suffered slight cuts and bruises in the crash, but none required hospital treatment. Damage to the vehicles was estimated at \$1,900.
