Of this \$7,000 was to finish the building, which is not yet insulated, and cover operating costs from March, 1968 to March, 1969. Murrell Defends Drive-In Theatre At Whitchurch Council Meeting

In the midst of the controversy over his proposed motel and drive-in theatre complex, C. E. Murrell appeared before the Whitchurch Township Council at last week's meeting. Mr. Murrell, who plans to build and operate the project on the Bloomington Sideroad east of Don Mills Road, has the approval of the newly-formed Whitchurch Industrial Development Commission but has stirred up objections among many of the ratepayers in the area. He told council he would like to start building right away, but that the drive-in would not open until next spring. He was unenthusiastic as to just when the motel would open, but he said that construction would take a considerable amount of time.

Constable Mills was struck by a car while he was investigating a minor accident in a heavy fog. Armin Garner, 44, driver of the car that struck the officer, has been charged with careless driving and dangerous driving. Mr. Garner lives in Newmarket. Constable Mills, a native of England, was dead on arrival at York County Hospital, Newmarket.

Whitchurch Constable Killed While Investigating Accident

Queen's Park Report

Two bills concerned with the rights of individuals were introduced into the Ontario Legislature last week. Labor Minister Dalton Bales announced a new act ensuring additional basic employment right to Ontario workers. It will replace several other acts and will establish new provisions: Time and a half for overtime beyond 48 hours. Equal pay for men and women doing the same work. Seven statutory holidays for which employees will receive time and a half if they work. The new act is designed to bring Ontario's employment standards legislation into line with working conditions that have wide acceptance in the province and should affect the non-union section of the labor force, particularly workers in the low income brackets. The Minister stated that on the basis of surveys and studies prepared by his staff, the minimum wage will be increased this year. Minister of Reform Institutions Allan Grossman announced the other bill, objectives of which are: Consolidating 18 existing acts dealing with adult offenders into one act; giving the Minister authority to establish a program to permit inmates of a correctional institution to participate in vocational and educational programs in the community; and giving the department authority to allow temporary absences to certain inmates for medical reasons or if it could assist in the inmate's rehabilitation. The bill will also equalize the provincial remission of sentence with that of federal institutions.
