Principal Ettore Mazzoleni of the Royal Conservatory of Music was killed early Saturday when he was struck by a car on Yonge Street North near the Gormley Sidewalk.

Dr. Mazzoleni, whose habit was to walk after meals, was walking along the road after a dinner party with friends. His wife and friends were to follow by car and pick him up when he reached the highway. When they arrived they found police investigating the accident. 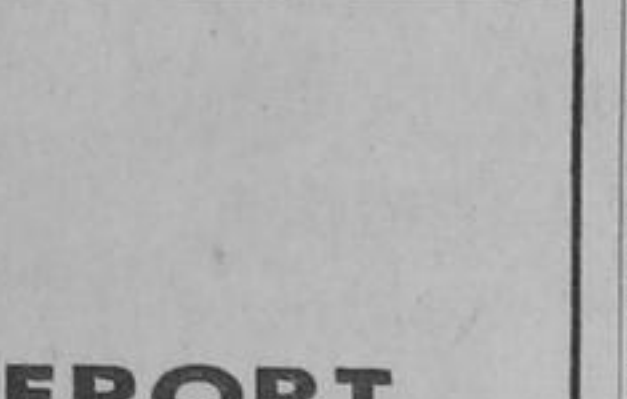

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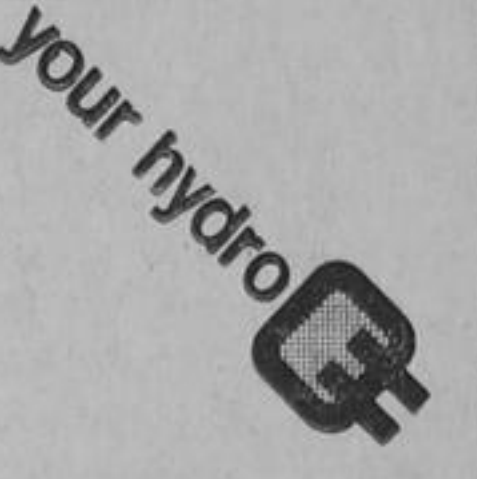
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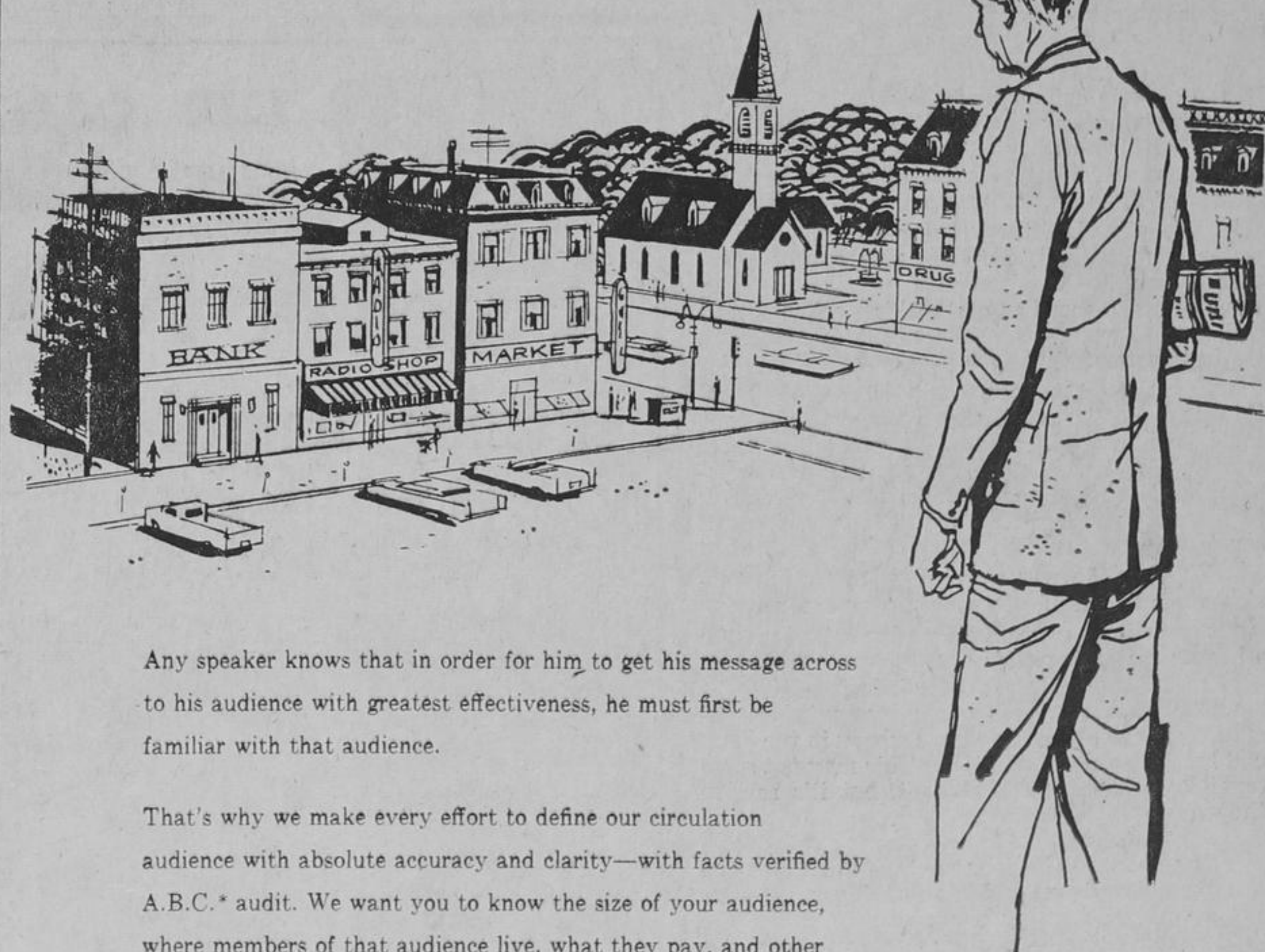
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
