### County Council Agrees To Study Aid To Mentally Retarded Adults

The welfare committee of The resolution carried with York County Council was in- no opposition. structed by a resolution passed at the May 23 session of council to make a study of possible county assistance to programs for the mentally retarded.

This followed refusal of the finance committee to recommend a \$25,000 debenture issue for the Newmarket and District Association for the Mentally Retarded. The committee members said they had not studied the merits of the request but only its financial aspects.

The association hopes to build an adult training centre in Newmarket, total cost of which would be \$75,000. The province will provide a grant of \$15,000 and the association will raise \$35,000 but had asked that the county issue debentures for the balance. The finance committee re-

commended against it however, stating that "with the debentures to which the county is committed, the debenture debt and the high rate of interest, we are unable to recommend to county council that such a debenture be issued." Finance Committee Chairman

Stewart Rumble, reeve of Markham Township defended the committee's action. "It is not the finance committee's job to determine the merits of the request," he said. Richmond Hill Reeve Donald

Plaxton pointed out, however, that in adopting the report, council could in effect be determining the merits of the request.

Markham Township Deputyreeve S. J. Gadsby who was chairing the committee-of-thewhole session insisted that the committee had only been requested to consider the issuing of a debenture, not the merits of the plan.

"You say you were asked only this specific question, but surely the finance committee must consider all aspects," replied Reeve Bailey. "I find it highly unusual for a committee not to do this."

Upshot was that the committee report turning down the debenture issue was passed, but subsequently a resolution was moved by North Gwillimbury Reeve Joseph Dales and seconded by Reeve Bailey that the welfare committee should study and report back to council on ways of assisting programs to aid mentally retarded adults in the county.




