

Soccer Rangers Defeated Again This Time Via 5-4 To Newmarket

The Richmond Hill Rangers are still looking for their first soccer win of the season. This time out it was a close 5-4 defeat Saturday at the hands of Newmarket in Newmarket.

The Rangers were forced to come from behind all day after taking an early lead at the 15th minute mark on a goal by outside left Roy Macauley who was set up on a neat pass from his inside left, Billy Keenan.

Disaster struck shortly after when Left Back Eric Stohr stopped playing as the ball went over the line for a throw-in but the referee did not blow his whistle allowing the Newmarket winger to lob the ball over all Richmond Hill heads.

Another defensive lap proved costly allowing a Newmarket forward to score making it 2-1. With right half and captain Dave Carlisle pushing the ball

up to his forwards it looked as though the Rangers were in for a big win as they took command of the play of the game. But scoring was a different matter.

Sam Macauley, John Slawson, Billy Keenan, Jim Henry, and Roy Macauley had a number of shots blocked that have been goals. Keenan hit the goalposts on three occasions.

Newmarket caught the Ranger defence napping on a breakaway and outside left Robbin Knohan crossed a pass to his inside right who in turn drove it past Hill keeper Mailey into to have Rangers' right back Karl Glazer stop it on the goal line with his hands. Result, a penalty shot.

Newmarket centre-half Stan Beck made no mistake with his low drive to make it 3-1.

with Macauley and Keenan combining with Billy Keenan. Keenan's drive had the goalie beat but Newmarket's left back stopped it with his hands. But Keenan made no mistake on the penalty shot.

Richmond Hill continued to press throughout the game but had little or no luck. Newmarket had only about five shots at Goalie Mailey and three of them were goals. The Rangers suffered the reverse fate sending 24 shots at Newmarket.

The second half saw much the same type action as the Rangers leapt to the attack as John Slawson dribbled past two Newmarket defenders, pushed the ball to Keenan, who faked a couple of passes before cracking his shot home to tie the game at 3-3.

Another Ranger error set Newmarket up again as the inside left scored.

The Rangers came right back. Jim Henry lobbed the ball into Sam Macauley who sold the Newmarket defence a dummy and let the ball roll to brother Roy who fired a blistering shot past the keeper to make it 4-4.

Richmond Hill moved in front with Henry putting the ball into the net for a fine goal only to have the referee call it back and give the Rangers a penalty kick. Billy Keenan took the kick and was foiled on a good save.

A Ranger official said later that it was "the first time he had ever heard or seen a referee over rule a goal."

This set back stopped the Rangers for a time and Newmarket took advantage scoring another goal.

With only five minutes to go the Rangers forced another corner with Roy Macauley sending a cross over to Keenan who's fine header hit the cross bar and was cleared by a defender.

Best for Newmarket was Stan Beck who came up with some fine defensive efforts to keep Newmarket in the game.

Best for the Rangers was Dave Carlisle at half. Best up front were the Macauley brothers along with Keenan, Slawson and Henry.

The Rangers missed the services of their regular right full-back, Jim Wright, who was on the sidelines with a groin injury.

The Rangers play Newmarket again this Saturday at Newmarket. Game time is 6 pm.

The second team also lost via 2-0 to Bradford.

The Hill's defence held a strong Bradford team to a 1-0 half with Emil Magnusson taking command in the centre half spot. On a number of occasions he stopped the Bradford forward line from making it more than 1-0. He was ably assisted by right half Bob Brown.

Richmond Hill missed one good chance when George Sheppard was wide on a close-in drive after being set up by John Trauffman. Wayne Clatworthy, playing his first game of soccer, almost scored for Richmond Hill from 20 yards out but was just wide of the net.

An injury occurred to Don Azzolino who re-injured a knee.

All CNR Depot's Functions Removed Despite Town Protest

Although Richmond Hill's CNR depot remains open, with an agent on duty, all its functions have been removed.

A letter sent by the CNR to the railway transport committee of the federal transport commission a copy of which was also sent to Richmond Hill Town Council, which had protested any cut in the services of the local depot, states:

"With the opening of the express terminal at Concord in August 1967, and implementation of carload transportation, of car control and carload service centres, studies are being undertaken with a view to centralizing express and transportation functions, while providing a better service to customers in smaller communities. Richmond Hill is one of the communities involved in this study and because of its proximity to Metropolitan Toronto would more than likely be one of the communities served by a centralized operation.

"With regard to passenger service at Richmond Hill, Train 87 to North Bay and other Northern Ontario points is the only train which stops at the station. For more than a year now the station has not been open at the scheduled arrival of the train. Passenger ticket sales at the station were discontinued January 31, 1968, and passenger requirements are looked after by the CN travel agent located in Richmond Hill.

"Carload functions have been handled by the Nortown Carload Centre at Toronto Yard since February, 1968, with express pickup and delivery service handled from the Concord terminal since March 15. On-hand express traffic is handled

by an outside commission express representative at Richmond Hill.

"During this experimental period, CN is attempting to show that comparable or even better services can be provided from centralized points."

The information about passenger trains is correct — although the southbound Northland will stop to detain revenue passengers at 6:55 am. The northbound train makes its stop at 8:45 pm. The Panorama, one of the transcontinental trains, which used to make a scheduled stop here in the early morning, as of April 26 has been re-routed through Maple.

Assistant Public Relations Manager W. T. Kelley informed "The Liberal" recently that only one objection about the withdrawal of services from the local depot had been received by the CNR.

Town council's objection had been prompted by a letter from Otto Pick Seed Co., a spokesman of which told this reporter that although so far the new service has proved reasonably satisfactory, the firm which makes carload shipments of seed preferred dealing with the local agent in the local station.

"We feel that a town of 20,000 with the number of industries that Richmond Hill has, deserves this type of service. We believe that there has been a lack of communication between the CNR and its customers. Although we know the railway has to look at the economics of every situation, we think a re-evaluation of the business in Richmond Hill would reveal that the operations there could be made to pay — it isn't costing the railroad that much."
