Grade 13 was light compared to just about any other year, at least if you took only four subjects. But it was a very different and very good year. Most of us got to know each other as complete persons, listening to and helping with each other's problems, trying to sort out our lives, to give them purpose and direction. In deciding on plans for the coming year, we took the first big step towards being responsible for our own individual lives.

And at Bayview Secondary, we became particularly aware of the twists of life and fate, of the difficulties and sorrows we shall have to face and overcome, when one of our classmates, well-

One week ago, the grade 13 marks were announced, and hundreds of students in Ontario are graduating from their secondary level education. It is a very happy occasion, but somehow sad, too. Much sadder even than graduation from public school. Because public school seems a mere stepping stone to the thrilling world of high school, but high school is a stepping stone to the beyond and the unknown.
