## Seek School Board Site For North Thornhill Pool

A tract of land south of the playing field at Royal Orchard Senior Public School is being considered for a swimming pool for a number of families in North

Donald Reid, of 152 Baythorn Drive; in his capacity as pool committee chairman of the North Thornhill Recreation Association, addressed the July 9 meeting of the Board of TSA1 Markham to ask that his group School land.

"At no time are we con-Reid emphasized. "This entire proposal is solely for the purpose of asking your assistance for the acquiring of the necessary land for this project." Originally Mr. Reid, on

behalf of the recreation association, approached Markham Township Council to ask for the use of a parcel

of greenbelt land on which to build a pool. Council approved the idea in principle, but no area suitable for the project could be found.

They considered the land to the rear of the Heintzman House, now the North Thornhill Community Centre, but found that when the land was sold to the township there was a clause included in the agreement which would prevent anything being done with the property that would create enough noise to disturb the surrounding residents.

The land Mr. Reid is now suggesting would be suitable for the pool is an area west of the Royal Orchard park-

"The board will have to take into consideration that Royal Orchard is a 14 room school, and is likely to become a 20 room school eventually," Supervising Principal Eilert Sand pointed out. "A new wing would have to

The North Thornhill Recreation Association encompasses an area bounded by the Toronto Ladies Golf Club on the south, Holy Cross Cemetery on the north, Yonge Street on the west and Bayview Avenue on the east. Mr. Reid explained that there are more than 900 homes in this area now. and there could be close to 1,200 when it is completed.

He put forward three suggestions as to how the board could make the land available to the association. He first advised that the board could "Lease to the association a portion of land on a long term lease at a nominal fee, which would permit the association to construct, operate, maintain and staff an outdoor swimming pool. which would appear to contradict Mr. Reid's introductory remarks about no financial participation by the board, was that the board could "join with the association in building an indoor/ outdoor pool which could be utilized by the school board for its activities during the year as well as the community and during the summer would be operated by the association.'

The third suggestion was the same as the first, except that no mention was made of school use of the pool. \* \* \* \*

Mr. Reid said that in the past many communities like North Thornhill have constructed swimming pools. "Some of these pools were built by the town or city, some constructed in conjunction with school boards, and others as a commercial enterprise," he commented. "The most successful enterprises were the ones con-

structed on a joint basis of the town and/or its school board and its families in the community. This feature is important since no plans for a pool are contemplated by Markham Township in the near future."

The land required by the association could vary in size from 100 feet square to 150 feet square. The pool they have in mind is 25 metres in an L shape. The difference in the amount of land would be accounted for by a larger deck area and a wading pool for children. There would have to be a small pool building for guard staff and housing for a filtration plant and lavatories.

Mr. Sand said it was a matter for the property committee to investigate, and the matter was referred to them. The property committee will study the proposal and discuss it with the Department of Education before any decision is reached
