Pigs is pigs and it appears they will stay that way in spite of their effect on Markham Village noses.

At a recent meeting of Markham Township Council a petition bearing a long list of village names was presented, protesting odors from a pigery operated just outside the village limits by Howard Jarick, Lot 14, Concession 8 near 16th Avenue.

Clerk Harry Crisp advised however, that the operation is a legitimate one in an agricultural zone and does not contravene any township bylaws. The barn on the property is well within the prescribed setbacks, he said, 400 feet from the road and 100 feet from the lot line.

The township had, however, refused permission when the owner had applied for a building permit in order to extend the operation, Mr. Crisp advised.

Deputy-reeve S. J. Gadsby suggested that the smell could be from garbage which some pigs are fed but villagers denied this. "It's not garbage, it's pigs," they insisted.

Reeve Stewart Rumble suggested that the Department of Agriculture might possibly be able to help out with the problem.

In the meantime, the clerk was instructed to notify the York County Health Unit and ask for a report on the situation.

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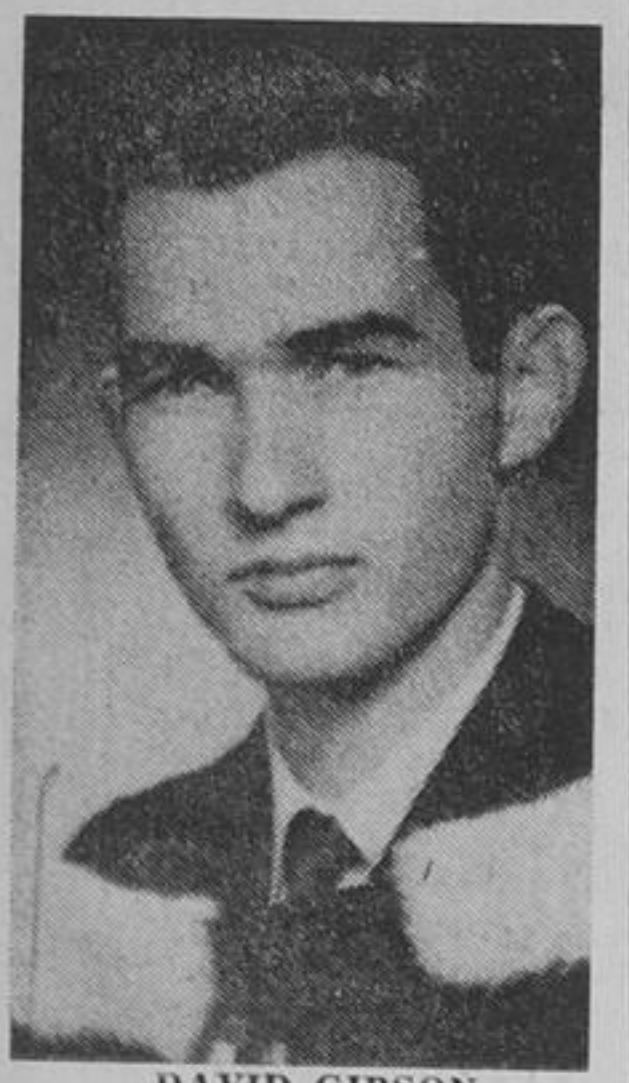
