**Obituary**  
**Wm. Savage, Lifetime Resident Died Saturday In His 95th Year**

William Savage, a lifelong resident of Richmond Hill, died Saturday morning at his home on Centre Street East, in his 95th year.

Canada was only six years old that November day in 1873 and Richmond Hill was just completing its first year as an incorporated village, when Peter G. Savage (later to serve many years as councillor and reeve) and his wife welcomed a baby boy, whom they named William. The home in which Mr. Savage was born still stands on the west side of Yonge Street (North of Centre) and is occupied by his nephew, also named William Savage.

Through the 95 years of his life, Mr. Savage has loved his community and taken an active interest in everything which affected its welfare. He was a member of Richmond Masonic Lodge and of St. Mary's Ang-

lican Church; and for more than a quarter of a century served the people of the village as a merchant, located in the Corner Block, on the northwest corner of Yonge and Arnold Streets.

Mr. Savage was predeceased by his wife, the former Jennie Palmer, 21 years ago. He leaves to mourn his passing one daughter, Adele (Mrs. R. Cardwell), 44 Centre Street East; two grandsons, Bruce and Brian Cardwell; and a great-granddaughter, Janet, all of Richmond Hill.

The funeral service was held Tuesday at the Marshall Funeral Home, with Rev. Fred C. Jackson officiating. Interment followed in Richmond Hill Cemetery, with three nephews, Garth, Ralph and Douglas Palmer, William Neal, Frank Tate and Arthur Foster acting as pallbearers.
