

Eliminate Markham

Kent's Lead Peterboro In Playoff

Richmond Hill Kent Clothes eliminated Markham from further OASA Senior "A" Intermediate playoff action last week and went on to down Peterboro in the first game of their best-of-three series in Peterboro.

Both contests were thrilling battles with the Clothiers winning both by identical 5-3 scores.

In the Markham contest hitting and some questionable Kent's trailed Markham 3-0 going into the top of the eighth inning when they came alive with three runs to tie the game.

They won it in the ninth on Join Mavor's two run homer. Bren Selvaige went the route for Kent's for the second straight time to record both wins in the Markham series. In the final game he allowed nine hits while striking out 14. Opposing hurler Ken May and reliever Cliff Lumley allowed Kent's only seven hits while striking out 14 men. Kent's started quickly with a run in the first as leadoff man Clark doubled. He attempted to steal third as the ball momentarily eluded opposition Catcher Don Wasson. Wasson retrieved the ball quickly and fired a strike to third sacker Gary McCewen. Clark appeared to be out but in sliding kicked the ball out of McCewen's glove and came in to score as the ball rolled to the Kent bench.

Richmond Hill added another short run in the fifth as Mavor doubled and Shelston brought him in with a single.

The lead was short lived as Peterboro scored all their runs for the game in the bottom of the fifth to go ahead 3-2.

Condie, who came to the rescue of Guio in the third with the bases loaded and one out and retired the side, seemed to lose his stuff briefly and gave up three runs before regaining his composure.

Peterboro Leftfielder Frank Kelly opened with a single, Pitcher Killens walked, and both runners scored as Shortstop Glen Pagett doubled to right. Pagett was out trying to stretch his double to a triple. McCewen then doubled, stole third, and scored on a wild pitch. Condie settled down to retire the next two batters and held the opposition scoreless for eight more innings.

Leading Kent hitting over the season, Alex Smith provided the offensive heroics as he batted in the tying run in the top of the eighth with a long fly to the base of the right field fence.

The long fly outscored Shelston who had doubled and gone to third on Rodger Ball's single. The teams battled to a scoreless tie through the ninth, tenth, eleventh and twelfth innings.

In the top of the 13th Smith blasted a two out homer far over the right field fence scoring Shelston ahead of him to win the ball game.

Peterboro threatened in the bottom of the 13th with the first two batters reaching base on a single and a walk but Condie managed to retire the side from there on in without further damage.

Smith had a single in addition to his homer and three runs batted in. Shelston had a double and two singles and one run batted in. Second Baseman Andy Watson had three singles. Doubles by Brian Clark and Mavor and singles by Ball and Larry Nelson completed the Kent's 12 hit total.

McCewen led Peterboro with the stick lashing out three hits including a double and two singles.

Kent's were scheduled to play this past Tuesday and a victory will have qualified them for the Southern Ontario finals.
