Vaughan Enrolment Up 145-97 From Markham

Total enrolment in Vaughan Township Public Schools on September 6 was 3.560 pupils, compared with 3.415 on the last school day in June. Ninety-seven new pupils came from Markham

Seventy-eight of the 97 are seven in kindergarten at Ross Doan School.

The township public schools have 128 classrooms in operation, including 115 regular grades, seven kindergartens and six special

The instructional staff includes: 12 principals, four vice-principals, nine supervisors, 130 full-time teachers in Northern Ontario with

of regular grades, five parttime teachers of regular grades, three teachers of Oral French (plus the supervisor), six itinerant librarians and one teacher of outdoor education, making a total of 171.

There are two teachers employed in each of three kindergartens and five supernumerary teachers. Superintendent MacDonald reported the supernumeraries have been placed in the largest schools and in schools where there are special needs. They will be used in supply teaching and he said he expects all will be absorbed into regular classrooms by the first of the year.
