Rev. Winch, who will be remembered as the former Padre to the Pubs, a post he held for four years, now lives in Toronto with his wife and five children. He is well known in this area since he was the minister at St. Paul's United, Lake Wilcox for nine years prior to his appointment as Padre to the Pubs.

He has been the full time director of the centre since August 1, but had served as acting director since March of this year. Prior to this he served on the board level


