Nation's Postmasters Sign New Wage Pact

A new labor contract was signed last week by the federal government and the Canadian Postmasters Association, representing 10,000 postmasters and their assistants.

The contract provides for salary increases of four per cent, dating from October 1, 1966, a further eight per cent from October 1, 1967, and another 6 1/2 per cent from October 1, 1968.

A post office official said pay scales vary greatly according to size of post office and amount of work involved for part-time postmasters in small rural centres.

The representative base rate for full-time assistants will go to \$5,330 from \$4,475. The top rate for a postmaster will go to \$7,818 from \$6,460.

To Replace 4 Small Schools OMB OK's \$647,550 Debenture Issue Whitchurch Public School

The Ontario Municipal Board has approved a debenture issue of \$647,550 to help finance a new 16-room public school in Whitchurch Township.

The school, which is located at Concession 5 and the Bloomington Sideroad, will cost an estimated \$724,538, it was disclosed at Whitchurch Township council meeting November 5.

The difference between the debenture proceeds and the eventual cost will be met out of existing funds of the township school board.

Foundations are now being laid at the school site. It is expected to be completed by September 1969. Work will proceed through the winter, except when weather is too severe.

After tenders had been received for its construction. When it is completed, four existing two-room schools in Whitchurch will be closed.

Some of the classroom space will be "open", that is, the "rooms" will have no wall or partitions. This will enable several classes and teachers to participate in lessons at the same time.

The school is modern in design and patterned after a semi-circular school in Barrie, the Allenby School.

The school was originally estimated to cost \$638,000, but this estimate was later revised to \$643,000, and then to \$724,538.

Four Contest One Whitchurch School Board Seat

Four candidates have so far announced that they will seek the one seat allotted to both Whitchurch Township and the Village of Stouffville on the new York County Board of Education.

Aurora and District High School Board Chairman Arthur E. Starr is one of the most recently declared candidates. He has been the Whitchurch Township representative on the board for the past eight years. The board administrators two secondary schools, at King City and in Aurora.

Mr. Starr has a BSA degree from the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph and is a production superintendent for a large Canadian food processing company. He has three children, one attending the University of Guelph, one at the University of Alberta and one at Vandorf Public School.

Whitchurch Township Public School Board Chairman Wesley Brillinger has also announced that he will seek a seat on the new board. Mr. Brillinger was the only member of the previous year's school board to survive the election last year and headed the polls at that time. There had been dissatisfaction in the township with the earlier board because of procedure at meetings, exclusion of ratepayers at meetings and the location of a new senior school.

Mr. Brillinger is a greens keeper and lives in the south central portion of Whitchurch Township at Lot 10, Concession 5. First elected to the Whitchurch Public School Board last year, Michael Ogden has also announced that he will run for the county board. Mr. Ogden is a mining geologist and lives at Lot 13, Concession 6. He has been the Whitchurch school board's representative on the Interim School Organization Committee this year, assisting in the compiling of information and recommendations for the new board.

Aurora High School Girl Faces Marijuana Trial

A 17-year-old Aurora highlight the penalties for first school girl, charged with possession of marijuana, November 5 was committed for trial by judge and jury after her lawyer, Arthur Maloney of Toronto, waived preliminary hearing.
