### To Run For Board Of Education

A fourth person has entered the Richmond Hill stakes for election to the York County Board of Education.

James Morley, 32, of Lawnwood Court, Richmond Hill, has decided to run principally because he is concerned about rising education expenditures and believes he has "the experience in handling large budgets to make sure our taxes are spent wisely."

Mr. Morley, a father of three young children, is a securities salesman with Richardson Securities, Toronto.

Another reason he is seeking a seat on the board is that he has "a keen interest in the welfare of young people."

His occupation would allow him the time required by education board responsibilities, he says.

Mr. Morley describes himself as active in community affairs. He says he teaches the Young People's Bible class at Richmond Hill Baptist Church, serves on the Christian education committee and is chairman of the Sunday school.

He comes originally from Calgary, but has lived in Richmond Hill since 1965.

He has held one public office. In 1964 he was elected to the finance committee of the Brentwood Community in Calgary, he says.

In Calgary he managed an office for Traders Group Ltd. in their industrial financing division. He is also a former sales manager of Simpson Motors, Lakeshore Boulevard, Toronto.

Mr. Morley says he is well acquainted with young people, having coached junior baseball and hockey teams in Toronto.

His wife, Patricia, is a supply teacher in Richmond Hill public schools.

Other persons so far contesting the two Richmond Hill seats on the county education board are: Deena Simpson, chairman of Richmond Hill Public School Board and a member of the Interim Schools Organization Committee; Jack Knott, vice-chairman of the Richmond Hill

Public School Board; and Robert Ross, a former chairman town councillor and present member of the York Central District High School Board.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL  
BY-LAW NO. 1340

A By-law to Amend By-Law No. 1000

THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT By-law Number 1000 be and is hereby amended by deleting Section 7.6 thereof and by substituting therefor the following paragraph:

"7.6 No land, building or structure except automobile service stations shall be used in the Town of Richmond Hill for commercial or industrial purposes which are likely to create danger from fire or explosion, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing shall include storage or manufacture of coal oil, water oil, rock oil, fuel oil, burning fluid, gas, naphtha, benzine, gasoline, dynamite, dualine, nitroglycerine, gunpowder, petroleum and petroleum products."

EXPLANATORY NOTE

By-law No. 1000 prohibited the use of lands or structures for the storage or manufacture of certain flammable liquids or explosives. This affected premises which stored small quantities of the materials such as hardware stores, etc.

The purpose of By-law No. 1340 is to prohibit the storage or manufacture of the substances only if likely to create danger from fire or explosion.

### York County Children's Aid Society Reports 80% Increase In Adoptions

York County Children's Aid Society has given service to 241 families involving 560 children during the first nine months of 1968. This represents an increase of 13% over 1967.

Work with unmarried parents has concerned 186 unmarried mothers, a percentage increase of 42% over 1967. That the counselling service provided has been effective is evidenced by the fact that in spite of the large percentage increases of cases in these two spheres, the number of children in care has remained relatively the same, with care now being given to 226 children.

The number of children placed in adoption has also increased significantly. A total of 117 children have been placed this year so far, a percentage increase of 80%.

These facts were revealed at the October 31 session of York County Council when a report was submitted by county council representatives on the board of the Children's Aid Society, Markham Village Reeve Alma Walker, Aurora Deputy-reeve J. H. Williamson, Newmarket Deputy-reeve

Clare Salisbury and Stouffville Deputy-reeve William Parsons.

Budget cuts, first of \$28,070 and then of a further \$25,085, arbitrarily imposed, had involved some curtailment of services, it was noted, particularly the hiring of a social worker for the family department.

In answer to a question by Markham Village Deputy-reeve Albert Laidlaw, it was revealed that the 1968 appointees of council to the board of the Children's Aid Society had had no say in consideration of the budget as they did not take their seats until after the society's annual meeting in March. Mrs. Walker agreed that in not attending meetings until March, new members were entirely uninformed on budgetary matters.

Mr. Laidlaw subsequently introduced a resolution which was carried by council that newly appointed members should take their seats in January, during the term of office of previous members who are entitled to sit on the board until the society's annual meeting in March.

### Alter Kostuik Charge

## Manslaughter Instead Of Murder

A charge against Michael Kostuik of Richmond Hill of murdering his wife Frances, August 24 has been withdrawn by Richmond Hill Police and he has instead been charged with manslaughter.

The new charge was read to Kostuik, 38, in Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court November 7. He made no plea.

After hearing evidence from a Toronto psychiatrist on Kostuik's mental condition, Magistrate Russell Pearce ordered him to be examined in the Ontario Hospital Penetanguishene for a 30-day period.

He was remanded to appear back in court December 5.

The dead body of Kostuik's 31-year-old wife was found by ambulance men in the kitchen of the Kostuik home at 417 North Taylor Mills Drive on August 25.

There was no one in the house at the time. An ambulance had been summoned by Kostuik through a telephone service.

An inquest into the death, held in Richmond Hill October 30, 31 and November 1, found that Mrs. Kostuik died as a result of excessive pressure by Kostuik on her chest in a fit of emotion.

Kostuik was taken into custody following the inquest on a coroner's warrant charging culpable murder.

That charge was withdrawn November 6 in favor of a murder charge laid by Richmond Hill police.

At the time of the death, Kostuik was employed on the night staff of the YWCA hostel at the CNR yards, Concord.

He has three small children, boys of seven and two and a girl of five, all of whom are

now with relations.

**EXAMINATION**  
Dr. Garry Prince, a Toronto psychiatrist who examined Kostuik November 5, told Richmond Hill Magistrate's Court November 7 that "there is enough evidence to indicate quite definitely that he (Kostuik) requires further observation in a mental hospital or psychiatric institution."

He described Kostuik as showing "emotions inappropriate with the fact that he was charged with murder and was in jail. It did not seem to concern him one little bit."

Kostuik was vague, rambling and inconclusive in his speech, and would not talk about the events leading up to his wife's death, the doctor said.

The examination indicated Kostuik had "a distinct thought disorder."

Dr. Prince also told the court that "the man's previous history had showed a gradual deterioration in the level of his employment over the past number of years, such that he obtained jobs less and less in keeping with his degree of intellectual capacity and university education."
