York County Children's Aid Society Reports 80% Increase In Adoptions

York County Children's Aid Society has given service to 241 families involving 560 children during the first nine months of 1968. This represents an increase of 13% over 1967.

ment used to teach the children lessons in safety.

Work with unmarried parents has concerned 186 unmarried mothers, a percentage increase of 42% over 1967. That the counselling service provided has been effective is evidenced by the fact that in spite of the large percentage increases of cases in these two spheres, the number of children in care has remained relatively the same, with care now being given to 226 children.

The number of children placed in adoption has also increased significantly. A total of 117 children have been placed this year so far, a percentage increase of 80%.

These facts were revealed at the October 31 session of York County Council when a report was submitted by county council representatives on the board of the Children's Aid Society, Markham Village Reeve Alma Walker, Aurora Deputyreeve J. H. Williamson, Newmarket Deputy-reeve

Clare Salisbury and Stouffville Deputy-reeve William Parsons.

Budget cuts, first of \$28,070 and then of a further \$25,085, arbitrarily imposed, had involved some curtailment of services, it was noted, particularly the hiring of a social worker for the family department.

In answer to a question by Markham Village Deputy-reeve Albert Laidlaw, it was revealed that the 1968 appointees of council to the board of the Children's Aid Society had had no say in consideration of the budget as they did not take their seats until after the society's annual meeting in March. Mrs. Walker agreed that in not attending meetings until March, new members were entirely uninformed on budgetary matters.

Mr. Laidlaw subsequently introduced a resolution which was carried by council that newly appointed members should take their seats in January, during the term of office of previous members who are entitled to sit on the board until the society's annual meeting in March.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL BY-LAW NO. 1340

A By-law to Amend By-Law No. 1000

THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF RICHMOND HILL, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT By-law Number 1000 be and is hereby amended by deleting Section 7.6 thereof and by substituting therefor the following paragraph:

"7.6 No land, building or structure except automobile service stations shall be used in the Town of Richmond Hill for commercial or industrial purposes which are likely to create danger from fire or explosion, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing shall include storage or manufacture of coal oil, water oil, rock oil, fuel oil, burning fluid, gas, naptha, benzine, gasoline, dynamite, dualine, nitroglycerine, gunpowder, petroleum and

petroleum products.' READ a First, Second and Third time this 29th day of July, 1968.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

By-law No. 1000 prohibited the use of lands or structures for the storage or manufacture of certain flammable liquids or explosives. This affected premises which stored small quantities of the materials such as hardware stores, etc.

The purpose of By-law No. 1340 is to prohibit the storage or manufacture of the substances only if likely to create danger from fire or explosion.
