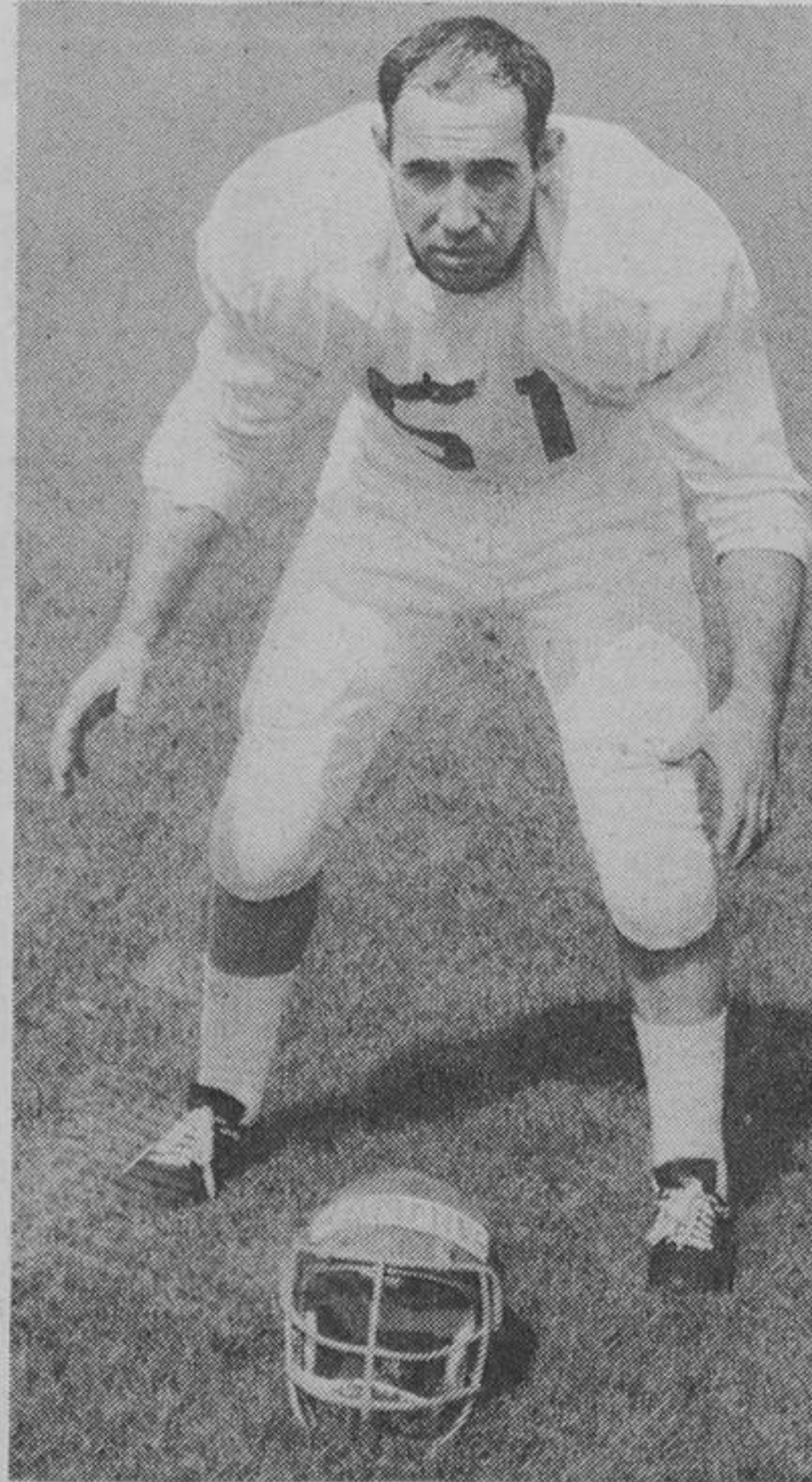
vember 24 to compete in a bonspiel at the Cleveland Skating Club.

Thornhill Trustees Are Acclaimed Near Agreement With Markham

Residents of Thornhill Police Village saved themselves the expense of an election by acclaiming the present three trustees to another two-year term, November 25. Renominated and acclaimed were Chairman Reginald Robinson of 23 Thornridge Drive, William Judges of 115 Brooke Street and Eric Cole of 53 John Street. Only four people besides the candidates attended the nomination meeting held at 15 Colbourne Street, a private home. In his remarks following the meeting Mr. Robinson noted that the village was near concluding a new road maintenance agreement with Markham Township. Under the new agreement Markham Township will continue to be responsible for the maintenance of roads on the east side of Yonge Street. No other details were disclosed concerning the agreement. Mr. Robinson said that he hoped that the agreement with Markham would be signed within two weeks. Negotiations with both Markham and Vaughan Townships have been continuing for the past two years. Mr. Robinson also said that he believes that the days of the police village as an administrative unit were numbered. However, he pointed out that until a suitable arrangement could be concluded with the townships and the provincial government the board of trustees would continue to protect the interests of the village residents. "The end of the police village is definitely only a matter of time," he said, "but it may be quite a long time."
