Markham Twp. Gets Good And Bad News From Water Resources Com.

Markham TSA 2 should be able to open its new senior public school at Unionville on schedule in January, since the Ontario Water Resources Commission, at its November 14 meeting, passed a resolution that construction of a watermain to the senior school at Unionville north of Varley Village "be processed toward approval". This information was contained in a letter read to Markham Township Council by Deputy-clerk Albert Shenfield last week.

In September, after work on the school was well on the way to completion, the OWRC refused to permit extension of water and sewage services to the new school until a reservoir and high-lift pumping station were constructed by the subdivider, Hengran Developments Limited.

The need for these two facilities was outlined by the OWRC earlier in the year and the developers had agreed to do the work but had held off pending agreement with the township to develop more residential lots.

The OWRC in its letter also stated that before any further subdivision plans are approved at Unionville, "the subdivision agreement must provide for construction of the water reservoir and high-lift pumping station, with completion coincident with the development of the subdivision." The commission also stipulates that "applications received for construction of services in such plan of subdivision be processed toward approval after construction of the reservoir."

Development in the Thornhill area will also be curtailed by a further requirement of OWRC. At the John Street sewage disposal plant, the commission requires "nutrient removal facilities be provided" and "expansion of sewage treatment facilities will not be considered, as stated in certificate of approval 65-A-1035".

This was interpreted to mean that if the township agrees to provide for further nutrient removal, its present application for enlarged capacity at the John Street plant will be considered.

It is also stipulated that a new well must be provided before there is further development.

Councillor Allan Sumner, chairman of the township's water and sanitation committee, had only one caustic remark on the commission's newest dictum: "I don't permit that I comment!"

When the John Street sewage disposal package plant which serves the North Thornhill area was built and put into operation only 18 months ago, it was a model plant. However, since that time, experience and studies by the OWRC has revealed that pollution of our streams and lakes can be further reduced by removing more nutrients from the sewage effluent. The "nutrient removal facilities" which the commission now wants at the John Street plant are being required in all new plants throughout the province.

These additional facilities will cost from \$100,000 to \$200,000 according to township officials, council was told.

Council considered the questions raised by this controversial OWRC letter at a committee meeting December 11, when planning and engineering personnel were present.
