No Dumping Law In Whitchurch

Clean up or be fined: That's the gist of Whitchurch Township's new anti-dumping bylaw passed by council December 3.

The new bylaw provides a \$300 fine for those convicted of dumping garbage and junk anywhere other than designated dumping

The law also states that vacant lots must be cleared of unsightly messes or covered over with clean earth by the property owner. Other provisions declare that holes and pits on property must be drained and filled and that no new excavations that may be a health or safety hazard to people in an area will be allowed.
