Constituents Say No MPs' Mail Rejects Vatican Recognition

Canada's possible recognition of the Vatican has stirred Canadians into writing their Members of Parliament and the reaction is anything but favorable.

John Roberts, York Simcoe, has received more than 35 letters on the subject, all opposing the recognition. However, he pointed out, most of the mail from constituents on any given issue is more anti than pro.

Mr. Roberts said the Vatican issue wasn't as strong as the estate tax subject (about 200 letters to his office) but it was running ahead of the abortion topic.

"Many people seem to feel that politics and religion shouldn't be mixed," he said. "Those opposing it are Protestants, people who don't like Catholics, and those who react to the Catholic Church as an anti-progressive force (recent en-

or four letters every day, and "without exception, they are all against recognition of the Vatican."

Mr. Roberts agreed with Mr. Roberts that mail regarding the estate taxes is still the heaviest.

He said that recognition letters, about 50 so far, have come from the clergy, the Orange Lodge, other groups, and many are from Roman Catholics.

"Evidently there is some objection to Canada's recognition of the Vatican," he said, "but if it's worth it, I don't know."

While the mails are obviously rejecting Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau's announcement, Mr. Danson said, "we would be an irresponsible government if we let the mails make the decisions." He added that the letters would all be considered, however, when the final decision was made.

Another Industrial Site Sold
Vaughan Industrial Committee Sets Criteria And Objectives

Vaughan Township has agreed to sell approximately 5.28 acres of industrial land to Goldberg and Frieberg of Toronto. The parcel of land is located on the northwest corner of the Snidercroft Road extension, in the industrial area adjacent to the CNR Marshalling Yard. Selling price was \$21,000 per acre. This was reported at council's February 25 meeting.

The purchasers have agreed to complete a building containing not less than 30,000 square feet of floor area on or before July 31, 1970.

Industrial Committee
At the second meeting this year held January 28, council decided to set up an industrial development committee. Named to it were Councillor Gordon Risk, Councillor David Fraser, Reeve Garnet Williams, Industrial Commissioner James McDonald and Planning Director John Dewar.

The committee presented criteria for its operation which were accepted by council February 25.

Objectives as set out in the committee's report are: to encourage and facilitate appropriate forms of development having regard to industrial, commercial and other developments which attract a high tax assessment structure; and to increase job opportunities for local residents and corresponding pools of labor for industry, thus ensuring that a greater share of money earned in Vaughan is reinvested locally.

The committee also defined its duties and functions as:
To encourage continued development of industry within the municipality to retain the present high ratio of industrial-residential assessment.
To act as a focal point for industrial development activities and enquiries. It was noted that the committee is aware that many initial enquiries are highly confidential and will continue to be directed to the industrial commissioners. Their main function will be to encourage a flow of enquiries.
The committee will study and recommend to council development policies such as imposed fees to developers, servicing arrangements, etc. and stable policies which will continue to attract desirable projects and at the same time maintain firm control of development.

Information sources, possibly a brochure, on community resources will be developed by the committee so that industry can easily assess the tremendous potential in Vaughan. It will periodically report to council on development activities and other matters.

News From Next Door
BRADFORD: Ontario Provincial Police have revealed that a Weston man who picked up an injured man on the shoulder of Highway 400 following an accident, knew the victim. Andrew Skrabak, 45, of Newmarket was taken to the motorist's home where he was removed to a hospital but was dead on arrival. He had complained of chest pains. Charges are pending.

WILLOWDALE: The North York Borough Traffic Committee will consider an idea to hire students to clean bus-stop shelters. Alderman Robert Yuill suggested that North York pay the students exactly what is paid a contractor. The student president at Downsview Secondary School said that grade 13 students need money to enter university and by cleaning shelters they could earn about \$400 each.

NEWMARKET: The Newmarket Library has been established for more than a century. In 1860 a library service was started in a cultural and education hall and by 1885 the service grew to 885 books.

BRADFORD: Bradford Co-Operative Storage Limited was fined \$100 recently for importing and selling an American-made weed killer that isn't registered with the federal Department of Agriculture.

Co-Op Manager John Fernhout testified that he had bought the U.S. product because it is \$5 per 50 lb. bag cheaper than the same product made in Canada. He said he bought 30,000 lbs.

John Russell of the agriculture department testified that the federal legislation is designed to assure product safety and quality.

NEWMARKET: A Holland Landing man, George Harrison, 24, whose only hope for survival is a kidney transplant, will undergo the operation soon at Toronto Western Hospital. The donor will be his mother — or possibly his mother-in-law.
