MPs' Mail Rejects Vatican Recognition

Canada's possible recognition of the Vatican has stirred Canadians into writing their Members of Parliament and the reaction is anything but favorable. John Roberts, York Sim-

oe, has received more than 35 letters on the subject, all opposing the recognition. However, he pointed out, most of the mail from constituents on any given issue

is more anti than pro. Mr. Roberts said the Vatican issue wasn't as strong as the estate tax subject (about 200 letters to his office) but it was running ahead of the abortion topic.

"Many people seem to feel that politics and religion shouldn't be mixed," he said. "Those opposing it are Protestants, people who don't like Catholics, and those who react to the Catholic Church as an anti-progressive force (recent encyclical on birth control)." Mr. Roberts said in a recent report that if Canada did move towards recognizing the Vatican it would be following the example of Great Britain which, for many years, has had diplomatic relations with the Vatican.

"One factor the government must consider," he said, "is that the Province of Quebec might well open a mission to the Vatican if the federal government fails to act." He later told "The Lib-

eral" that Quebec could open

a channel of communications

for large numbers of Roman Catholics. "But I am sure the government will take no action until there has been ample time for public discussion.

Barney Danson, York North, said mail on the subject has been "heavy". He said he receives about three

or four letters every day, and "without exception, they are all against recognition of the Vatican.'

Mr. Danson agreed with Mr. Roberts that mail regarding the estate taxes is still the heaviest. He said that recognition

letters, about 50 so far, have come from the clergy, the Orange Lodge, other groups, and many are from Roman Catholics. "Evidently there is some

objection to Canada's recognition of the Vatican," he said. "but if it's worth it, I don't know."

While the mails are obviously rejecting Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau's announcement, Mr. Danson said, "we would be an irresponsible government if we let the mails make the decisions." He added that the letters would all be considered, however, when the final decision was made.

Mr. Danson estimated that

about 70 countries presently recognize the Vatican.

Prime Minister Trudeau has recieved more than 500 letters opposing recognition and only a few in favor.

Spokesmen for Conservative Leader Robert Standfield and NDP leader Tommy Douglas said the two party leaders have not received a letter in favor of recogni-

In the case of Mr. Standfield, the latest count showed 156 against recognition.

Mr. Trudeau saw the Pope on January 16 in Rome, and told a news conference afterwards that the federal cabinet has decided in favor of recognition of the Holy See. He quoted the Pope as welcoming the move but leaving it entirely up to Canada.

Mr. Trudeau also said in Rome that he would await reaction to his announcement before the next move was






