Mrs. Clarke Peters introduced her life-long friend, guest speaker Mrs. Dennis Stratmeyer, on furlough from Guatemala, where she works for Wycliffe Bible Translators Inc., of 44 Nugent Road, Weston.

Dennis and Jean, translators and linguists with their children, Jayne, 12, Gail 10, Mark, nine, Neil, six, have been in Guatemala with the Jacalote Tribe for 10 years. These natives need at least some of their native tongues written in their native language. Some of the Wycliffe workers are located in very large, aboriginal tribes of a few hundred members, some among larger tribes, to whom head hunting is still a tempting recreation. They travel by burro to a mountain village at 7,600 feet altitude. Wycliffe also has jungle aviation and radio service serving translators in Peru, Ecuador, Bolivia, Brazil, Columbia, Philippines and New Guinea.

Linked together only by radio and by their own jungle-hopping airline, these daring young pioneers confront dangers hazardous enough to blanch the most intrepid armchair adventurer. In 19 countries, 2,040 members of Wycliffe are translating 425 languages. They create primers, dictionaries of the unwritten aboriginal languages and set up schools and train native teachers.

Doors into the tribes are rapidly opening to their type of approach. The Bible translation program has moved forward swiftly in the past 35 years encouraging completion of the task in the next 25 years. In order to take the word to 2,000 more illiterate tribes, 6,000 more translators and support personnel are needed. Other missions are working in Spanish in Guatemala. As well as translating work, they have linguistic schools, that is another phase entirely from WBT. The Summer Institute of Linguistics holds courses in Oklahoma, North Dakota, Seattle, Brisbane, Australia, London, England and Germany. All these organizations work for the betterment of the illiterate tribes. They encourage students who are theologically conservative or evangelical to join their groups for study and later to advance to the fields.
