Council Approves Revised Plan Vaughan Industrial Subdivision

A subdivision agreement will be drawn up between Industrial Maple Holdings Limited and Vaughan Township for an industrial development at the corner of Keele Street and the Teston Sideroad. President of the developing company is Mrs. M. A. Neale of Maple, whose husband owns Dominion Welding Engineering already located on the 54-acre site.

At the April 22 meeting of township council revisions to recommendations made by planning board at the April 8 meeting were considered. These revisions included: (a) that Blocks D and G remain as originally shown subject to Dominion Welding Engineering's westerly access being moved to the westerly limit of Block E and access to Block D be located at the easterly limit thereof.

One entrance on to the Teston Sideroad would then serve for both lots. Dominion Welding Engineering will be permitted to maintain its second access for purposes of loading and unloading only.

(b) that Blocks C and F remain as originally shown subject to one entrance on to Keele Street only. It will be located at the limit of F which is the south limit of C with both

blocks having access to Keele Street by way of a common drive.

(c) that Blocks A and B be part of the dedication for road widening purposes and together with all other road widenings, easements, etc. be dedicated free of all encumbrances and without charge.

(d) that "cash in lieu of 5% of the lands in the plan be given for public purposes other than highways" not be applicable.

(e) that an agreement be entered into that the township shall not be required to issue a permit for construction of a building until a site plan has been filed and approved by the planning board.

(f) that the plan of subdivision be placed under part lot control at the time of registration.

(g) that development be permitted on septic tanks and individual wells.

(h) that the existing right-of-way be shown as an easement. Services to be provided and paid for by Industrial Maple Holdings Ltd. are: paved roads to township standards; storm sewers where necessary, street-lighting overhead wiring and necessary transformers, street name signs and traffic signs. The developers will also be required to pay 3% engineering fees, \$345 per block capital contribution and \$115 per block legal and administration costs.

Mrs. Neale asked if any lots could be sold before road work is done and was assured that she could sell any two lots before starting construction of the internal roads.

She also reported she had signed an agreement with Toronto and York Roads Commission giving them access to the land necessary for widening of Keele Street.

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Vaughan Township To Subsidize Woodbridge & Pine Grove Buses

Vaughan Township Council has agreed to pay half of a TTC per month subsidy to the \$75 to provide transportation between Woodbridge and Metro, it was agreed at its April 22 meeting. The Village of Woodbridge will pay the other half.

Notice had been received from the TTC and Gray Coach Lines that the present bus service north from Steeles Avenue to Woodbridge and Pine Grove will be discontinued April 27. The franchise is held by Gray Coach but the TTC has been providing the service.

Patronage, the TTC claims, is, and always has been, insufficient to cover costs of operation. Increased costs and a tightening of Gray Coach's budget have made it not economically feasible to continue to operate the service on the present basis. Gray Coach took over the line when Metro was formed in 1953 as part of the provisions of Bill 80. Buses have

been running to and from Woodbridge every half hour from 6 to 9 am and from 3 to 7 pm and every hour from 9 am to 3 pm and from 7 pm to 12 midnight Mondays to Fridays and every hour from 6 am to 12 midnight on Saturdays.

It has been decided to reduce the existing service to six trips a day, five days a week during rush hour periods only — buses to leave Woodbridge at 7, 8 and 9 am and arrive at Woodbridge at 4, 5 and 6 pm.

The new schedule will be tried for a period of two months. If it is to continue beyond this two month period on a subsidized basis, a "transportation area" will be established and the cost of the subsidy will be levied against the area. Negotiations will also be undertaken with the Village of Woodbridge to arrive at an agreement regarding cost of subsidy to each municipality based on the percentage of use.
