

Vaughan Township Council Says Pemberton Crescent Area Owners Will Get Watermain, Roadwork

Residents on Pemberton Crescent from Bathurst Street easterly and on Bathurst Street between Pemberton Road and Pemberton Crescent will have Vaughan Township water in their homes and Pemberton Crescent will be rebuilt this year, if OMB approval is received.

The installations will be made under the Local Improvement Act and council's local improvement policy. Approval was given to the two projects at the April 22 meeting of Vaughan Township Council.

In June 1968 a petition to have watermain services installed on Bathurst Street from Pemberton Road to Pemberton Crescent, thence easterly along the crescent to the east limit of Lot 93 as a local improvement was presented to township council. Council gave its approval.

During the time approval was being sought from the OMB a second petition was received for extension of the proposed watermain. The township solicitor attempted to have the OMB combine the petitions but the board suggested a new peti-

tion be made for the entire work. A suitably signed petition for the watermain was received March 31, and has now received council approval. A for 27 lots on Bathurst and Pemberton Crescent, the existing 12 inch diameter watermain will be extended approximately 880 feet northerly and a six inch diameter main will be installed on Pemberton Crescent from Bathurst to the east limit of Lot 95. Registered Plan

2027. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$37,320. Of this amount the township will pay a total of \$14,970. This includes \$4,200 for six hydrants and \$10,777.43 for the township's share of frontage.

The total frontage is 4,106.72 feet and cost per foot frontage will be \$7.61. The cost will be debentured at 9 percent interest for a 20 year period, with the private water connections (½ inch diameter) will cost \$135 being \$2,241.32 and the township's \$1,639.91 for a total annual payment of \$3,881.23.

Six properties have frontage of 116.16 feet, eight have 122.42 feet and the others have from 66.58 to 106.25 feet. Private water connections (½ inch diameter) will cost \$135 being \$2,241.32 and the township's \$1,639.91 for a total annual payment of \$3,881.23.

Pemberton Crescent will consist of constructing a 22 foot wide travelled gravel road with double surface treatment and open ditches, from Bathurst Street to the east limit of Lot 95. Registered Plan 2027. The cost of constructing 1,215 linear feet of road is estimated at \$26,708.

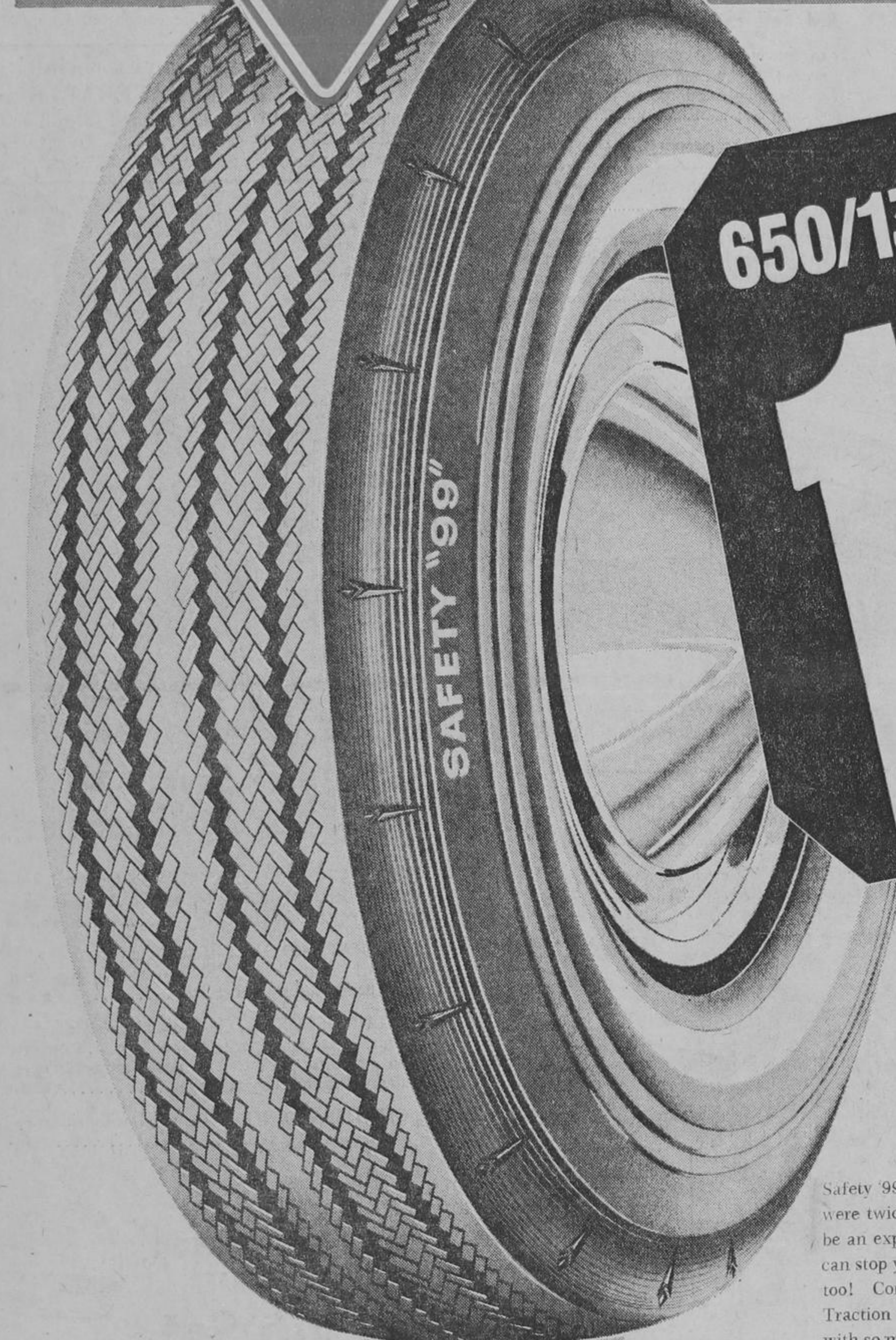
